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

Let's talk:

Why didn't Jeremy want to see his dad? What had Jeremy done wrong? Was it easy for Jeremy to say, "I'm sorry"? Why did Jeremy feel so good the next day? The Bible says "Be glad in the LORD... and shout for joy" because God forgives our sins every day for Jesus' sake (Psalm 32:11).

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 32:8-11

Let's pray: Dear Lord, we're glad we can come to You at any time and receive forgiveness. Keep us from doing wrong, make us sorry for our sins, and keep us as Your happy children because we believe in Jesus, our Savior. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



What God Made

"My new bike is scratched," Jordan said. "I'll wait a few days; maybe it will get better." Will that bike get fixed? Not by itself.

"My hand is scratched," Ashley said. "I'll put on a Band-Aid; soon it will be better." Will that hand get better by itself? Yes, it probably will.

What's the difference? A human person made the bike. God created the hand. The things God created are much more wonderful than anything a human being can make.

What did God create? The Bible says that, in the beginning, all things in the world were created by Him. God created the sun and the moon and the stars. He created the lions and the cows. He created grass and trees and made them begin to grow. He created the first people.

"God saw everything that He had made, and . . . it was very good," says the Bible (Genesis 1:31). What do you think of that?

When the world was created, God told the first people to take care of the world and rule it (see Genesis 1:28–30 and 2:15). He put many wonderful things into the world for people to use to make things. He also gave people minds so they could figure out how to make things.

In the very beginning, all things were created by God. And the things God created still can't be made by people. You see, God is much wiser and greater than the people He created.



Let's talk:

Why can a hand fix itself while a bike cannot? What are some things God created? For whom did He create them? What did He give to people so they could make things from what He had created? What must God be if He created everything in the world?

Older children and adults may read:

Genesis 1:1-31

Let's pray: What a wonderful world You have created for us, Lord. All You have created shows Your great power and love. We're glad that You created us and that You also saved us when we became spoiled by sin. Give us your Holy Spirit so we may all be and remain Your children. In Jesus' name. Amen.



Not Seen, but Loved

"Mom, what does Jesus look like?" asked Shanika. Her aunt had given her a picture of Jesus for her birthday, and it didn't look like other pictures of Jesus at all.

Her mother couldn't tell her. "I don't know, honey," Mom said. "And nobody else knows either. Nobody made a picture of Jesus when He lived on earth. The pictures we see are just the way some painters thought He may have looked."

Let's pray: We would love You, dear Jesus, no matter how You looked. We love You because You loved us and died on a cross to save us. Keep us from sin and take us to heaven, where we will see You and be with You forever. In Your name. Amen.

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, we're glad that You are our God and Savior and that we are Your children. Please help us remember that we serve You whenever we serve those around us. Then our work will become more enjoyable, and we will do it with gladness. In Your name. Amen.



Let God Do Your Worrying

Ramon was taking his first trip in an airplane. He was on his way to Grandma's with his father and mother. Ramon was looking out the window at the wing, the clouds, and the ground far, far below.

"Mom," Ramon said, "that big wall of clouds is blocking our way. Where will we go?"

"Don't worry," said Mom.

Dad said, "Let the pilot worry about that, Ramon. He's flown to Cincinnati before."

Everything turned out all right. By the time they reached the big bank of clouds, the airplane was high above it. Ramon looked out the window again but now he couldn't see any ground below, only the clouds.

"Mom," said Ramon, "how does the pilot know where Cincinnati is when he can't see the ground? All that's below us are clouds, and I don't see any signs to tell him where to go. What if he makes a wrong turn?"

"The pilot knows what he's doing," said Mom. "Let him do the worrying."

Ramon was young and had never flown before, so he worried about a lot of things. Even adults worry about things. Some say, "I'm afraid we won't have enough money when we're old." Others say, "I don't see how we can pay our doctor bill," or "How am I going to do all my work?"

The Bible says, "God cares for you." This also means, "God worries for you." In a way, He is like the pilot of an airplane. God knows the way, and He'll get you there safely. He'll also take care of you on the way. So why worry? Let God do your worrying for you.



Let's talk:

Why did Ramon worry on the airplane? What did his mother and father tell him? Why do adults worry sometimes? Who is willing to worry for us? Why? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 23

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, we thank You for being willing to do our worrying for us. Please forgive us when we don't trust You. Help us remember how much You love us so we won't worry. In Your name. Amen.

I will give thanks to You, O Lord, among the peoples; I will sing praises to You among the nations.

Psalm 108:3



Singing Praises to God

Kylie was only three years old and couldn't talk very clearly, but she was singing at the top of her voice, "Dedud love me, did I know, fo da Biba tell me toe."

Do you know what she was singing? It doesn't matter. She was singing praises to God, and He heard it and was happy.

"I will sing praises to You," said King David in Psalm 108. Almost every Christian boy or girl sings praises to God too. Why? Because in the Bible, God has promised to love us and help us and keep us as His children for Jesus' sake. That makes us want to thank and praise God, doesn't it?

What's one of the best ways to praise the Lord? By singing songs. Songs that tell what God has done for us help us thank Him for His wonderful love.

How many songs about God do you know? At home, in Sunday School, in church, or anywhere else, do you sing songs to God with gladness? Do you praise God when you sing songs about Him, or do you just move your lips and make sounds?

While you're waiting for church to begin, turn to a hymn you like and memorize a verse. Learn another verse each time you're in church until you know it all from memory. Then you can sing it at home, on the way to school, or any time.

It's good to sing to the Lord and praise Him with singing. Those who know and love God say, "I will give thanks to You, O LORD, among the peoples; I will sing praises to You among the nations."



Let's talk:

What was Kylie singing? Why was God happy? Who said he would sing praises to the Lord? Why do God's children enjoy singing songs about Him? What songs about God do you know? How could you learn more songs? What song could you sing together right now?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 108:1-5

Let's pray: Dear Lord, teach me to sing Your praises. In Jesus' name. Amen.

The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it. Psalm 24:1 (NIV)



What Do You Think You Own?

"It's mine, and you can't have it," Aneko said to Kami. They were playing dress-up. Aneko was wearing one of her mother's old dresses. She was reaching for the hat Kami wanted for her outfit.

"It's mine," said Kami. "It's mine as much as yours." Their mother came in just as the two began to argue. "Whose hat did you say that was?" Mom asked.

The girls looked at each other and began to giggle. "It's yours, Mom," they said together.

"But didn't I hear you say it was yours?" Mom asked Aneko.

Mom sat on the floor next to the girls. "Do you know what this makes me think about?" she asked. "God gives us so many things: food to eat, clothes to wear, a house to live in, good health so we can work and earn money, a mind that can think. Let's talk:

Whose hat did both girls want? Whose hat did they say it was? Why do people act as though things belong to them? How many things really belong to us? Why does God give us things? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 50:10-15

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, please help us remember that all things in heaven and on earth belong to You and that we really don't own anything. Make us willing to use what You give us in ways that please You. Keep us from becoming selfish and thinking that things belong to us. Make us thankful for Your gifts and willing to help other people with them. In Jesus' name. Amen.



How to Get Clean Inside

"Did you wash your hands, Jamal?" Mom asked.

"Yeah," came the quick reply. But when Jamal showed his hands to his mom, she was a little suspicious of his answer.

"You didn't use soap, did you? And you didn't wash here and here," she pointed out. So Jamal had to wash his hands again. This time he scrubbed them with soap.

There's one way children can usually get clean the first time—when they let their parents wash them. When parents do the washing, the outside usually is spotless.

But even parents can't wash away the bad things their children think and say and do. Parents can't wash away their children's sins. Only God can do that. When He forgives our sins, He washes them all away. That is why King David said, "Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow."

When your mom or dad does laundry, he or she wants everything to be clean, especially the white clothes. White shirts and sheets with streaks and stains on them aren't clean and beautiful. When we sin, it's like a stain on a clean sheet.

God wants His children to be clean on the inside. And we want to be clean and white on the inside for God, even when our hands and clothes get dirty. Because Jesus died and rose for us, we are clean on the inside. When God forgives us, He washes us so not even one speck of sin is left. Isn't that wonderful?



Let's talk:

Who could have washed Jamal better than he washed himself? What can't Jamal's mother wash away? Who alone can wash us on the inside? When God washes away sins, how many are left? How does God wash away our sins?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 51:1-7

Let's pray: Forgive us all our sins, dear God, so we may be whiter than snow and holy in Your eyes. In Jesus' name we ask this. Amen.



Always Thank God!

- "Go to school. Wash the dishes. Make my bed," Rachel grumbled.
- "Rachel, you're always grumbling," her dad said.
- "Well, what should I do?" grumbled Rachel again.
- "Jesus wants us to be thankful for everything," said Dad.
- "Always?" asked Rachel. "For everything?"
- "That's what it says in the Bible," Dad answered. "'Always [give] thanks to God the Father for everything.'"
- "You mean I should thank God for having to wash the dishes and make my bed?" Rachel asked.
- "Some people never have dirty dishes because they don't have much to eat," Dad replied. "There are some people who never have to make their beds because they're too poor to have beds."

Let's talk:

Why did Rachel grumble and complain? What Bible verse did Dad teach her? What can we thank God for when we have dishes to wash? Why can we be thankful that we have a bed to make? Which person reflects Jesus' love—the thankful person or the one who whines? Which person is happier—the person who grumbles or the one who is thankful?

Older children and adults may read:

Ephesians 5:17-21

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, help us remember how much You love us. Help us believe that all things are just right for those who love You. Help us live as Your thankful children. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



Following Our Leader

"Follow the leader!" cried the boys and girls at Jason's birthday party. Then Jason led everyone up into the attic and down into the basement and outside between the bushes and around the trees.

When the children came in for lunch, Jason's father said, "You're all very good at following the leader. I didn't think Christina would keep up with you.

"I know another way to play that game," said Dad.

"Let's play it," the children shouted.

"Maybe I shouldn't have said it was a game," Dad added. "It's really about how we are to live our lives. As Christians, we're supposed to follow our Leader—God. When you were playing follow the leader, I remembered a Bible verse. It says 'Be imitators of God.' I wrote it on a card for each of you to take home."

Everybody looked at the cards by their plates. It had these words printed on it: "Be imitators of God."

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, we don't always imitate You as we should. Please forgive us. Send us Your Holy Spirit to help us imitate You. Help us to love others as You have loved us. In Your name. Amen.



God Sees Everything

"I wish God didn't see everything," Daniel said. "Then He wouldn't see what I do wrong."

"I'm glad God sees everything," replied Kyle. "That's how He can help me all the time."

Both Daniel and Kyle had good reasons for what they said, but who do you think was right?

The Bible says, "The eyes of the LORD are in every place." God sees the bad we do and also the good. He knows what we're thinking and whether we believe in Him. The eyes of the Lord see in the dark as well as in the light. They see us all the time.

We're all like Daniel. We sin and wish God couldn't see it. But we can't hide from God; He is everywhere. And we can't hide what we do from Him because He sees everything.

There's only one way to hide our sins. God has to hide them. We know that God forgives our sins for Jesus' sake. And He doesn't just cover them up, He completely wipes them away. Because He forgives our sins, we never have to be afraid of Him. Instead, we can be glad that God sees us everywhere so nothing can hurt us.



Let's talk:

Where are the eyes of God? What does this mean? Why didn't Daniel like it? Why was Kyle happy that God's eyes are everywhere? What is the only way our sins can be hidden from God? Why don't we ever have to be afraid that God can see us? Why is it a good thing that the eyes of the Lord are everywhere? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 139:1-12

Let's pray: Dear Lord God, we know we can't hide anything from You. You know the truth about us all the time. Please forgive all of our sins for Jesus' sake so we don't have to be afraid of what You see. Then we can be happy that Your eyes are everywhere and are always watching over us. In Jesus' name. Amen.



God Counts Our Hairs

"How many children are there in the world, Daddy?" asked Luisa.

"I don't know," said her daddy. "Millions and millions of them, I guess."

"Then how can God take care of me?" asked Luisa.

"How can He know where I am and what's happening to me? There are so many other boys and girls."

"God knows about you all right," said Daddy. "He not only knows you, He knows how many hairs you have. And He knows when one of them falls out.

"How many sparrows do you think there are in the world?" Daddy asked.

Luisa thought for a moment. "More sparrows than children, I guess," she answered.

Let's talk:

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 10:29-39

Let's pray: We thank You, dear Father in heaven, for loving us and watching over us. Remind us that You know all about us at all times and nothing can happen unless You let it happen. Keep us from sin and every evil for Jesus' sake. Amen.



How Jesus Obeyed for Us

Who was the only perfect boy who ever lived? It was Jesus. When His mother, Mary, asked Him to get some water for her, He did it gladly. When His earthly father, Joseph, who was a carpenter, needed someone to hold a board, Jesus did it gladly. Jesus didn't grumble. He didn't disobey. He probably even did things without being asked.

The Bible says Jesus *obeyed* His earthly parents.

But didn't Jesus ever play? Oh, yes. His parents gave Him time to play, and they had fun together with Him. They probably had a happy home in Nazareth. His parents were happy because Jesus obeyed them.

Jesus is God. God doesn't have to obey people. But Jesus had a special reason for obeying Mary and Joseph. He did all the things God wants *us* to do. Jesus did everything perfectly for us so we could be saved. Because of His example, we know we should obey our parents in everything. When we love Jesus, we willingly obey our parents.



Let's talk:

Who was the best boy who ever lived? How well did He obey His parents? Why didn't Jesus really have to obey His parents? Why did He want to obey them? How well does He want us to obey our parents? Why do we want to obey our parents? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Colossians 3:20-25

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, please forgive us for not always obeying our parents the way You obeyed Mary and Joseph. Send us Your Holy Spirit to help us become more like You and gladly do what our parents ask. In Your name. Amen.





How Others Get to Know You

"That boy over there looks like a good boy," said Mr. Brandt to the check-out person at the grocery store.

"He does now, but let's watch him for a few minutes," replied the checker.

They watched the boy. He hit his mother because she wouldn't get the cereal he wanted. He stomped down the aisle toward the cookies. When his mother asked him to come back, he turned his back to her. A girl was in front of the cookies he wanted so he pushed her out of the way.

"Watching that boy reminds me of the Bible verse, 'Even a child makes himself known by his acts,'" said the checker.

"You can know what kind of person a child is by what he or she does. That boy isn't acting like a good boy. He doesn't obey his mother or treat others as he would like to be treated."

Jesus said "By their fruit you will recognize them" (see Matthew 7:15–20). He meant that you will know a person from the things he says and does.

It's easy to say we love Jesus. But people can tell whether we really love Him by the way we act. Even children are known by their actions. What does your behavior tell about you? Can others see that you're a Christian from the way you act? Those questions remind us to act as Jesus would. Then people will know that we belong to Him.



Let's talk:

At first, what did Mr. Brandt think about the boy in the store? What changed his mind? What Bible verse did the check-out person tell Mr. Brandt? What did Jesus mean when He said you could know people by their fruits? If people, even children, say they are good but they behave badly, are they good or bad? How can children show that they love Jesus?

Older children and adults may read:

Proverbs 20:11–13

Let's pray: Dear God, we want others to know that we're Your children. We want to be witnesses for You so others can see our good actions and learn about You. Please help us do what is right so people will know that we love Jesus. Thank You for forgiving us when we do wrong. In Jesus' name. Amen.



God Can Do Anything

One winter some enemy soldiers were entering a little town. A Christian mother sat in one of the houses near the town. She was praying.

"Dear God, please build a wall around us and protect us from the soldiers," she prayed.

When should God keep His promises: when He knows the time is right or when we think the time is right? What's the best way for God to answer our prayers: how we want them answered or the answer *He* knows is best?

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 1:26-38

Let's pray: Dear God, thank You for the wonderful promises You have given us in the Bible. Thank You most of all for sending our Savior as You promised You would. We're glad that You can do anything and that You always keep Your promises. Help us trust You always, for Jesus' sake. Amen.



A Man Who Was Helpful

A man was riding on a donkey down a dusty road. Suddenly some robbers jumped from behind a rock. They hit the man over the head. He fell off the donkey, and the robbers beat him. They took all his money and possessions. Then they ran away into the hills. They left the man lying next to the road. He was almost dead.

Two people who saw the injured man walked past him. They didn't want to help. Then a kind stranger came by. He felt sorry for the injured man. He stopped to help. He bandaged the man's wounds. He put the man on his own donkey and took him to a hotel. He even paid somebody to take care of the man until he got better.

When we need help, wouldn't we want some kind person to help us? If someone needs help, Jesus said we are to be good neighbors, like the one who helped the injured man in the story. We are to love our neighbors as we love ourselves. And we love our neighbors because Jesus first loved us.



Let's talk:

What happened to the man in the hills? What did two people do when they passed by the injured man? What did the third man do? Which one loved his neighbor? Have you ever helped someone?

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 10:30-37

Let's pray: Heavenly Father, please forgive us for doing so little for others. Show us how to be good helpers and make us glad to help. We ask this for Jesus' sake. Amen.





Are You Glad to Go to Church?

"Do I *have* to go to Sunday School and church?" asked Garrett. His friends were going fishing, and they had asked him to go along. "Do I *have* to?"

"Yes, Garrett, you have to," said Dad. "But what will it take to make you say, 'I want to'?"

"But it's going to be a great day for fishing," said Garrett.

"It's also going to be a great day for hearing God's Word," said Dad. "Sunday is called the Lord's day. Every day belongs to Him, but Sunday is one day when Christians go to their church. Those who love Jesus more than anything else say what King David said long ago."

"What was that?" asked Garrett.

"He said, 'I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD." 'He wrote that in one of his psalms, or songs of praise, to God," explained Dad.

"You know what, Dad, I'm glad to go to church," said Garrett. "Only tomorrow, I'd like to go fishing."

"I know how you feel," said Dad. "It isn't that you don't want to go to church. I'm sure you'd be very unhappy if our church were closed and we didn't have any place to worship God. But what if everybody went fishing tomorrow? Do you think there would be a church service?"

"No, I guess not," said Garrett.

"What if we went fishing in the afternoon?" asked Dad.

"That would be great, Dad," said Garrett. He really did *want* to go to church because he loved Jesus. Now he was glad he could go fishing too.

What would Garrett have loved more than God if he had gone fishing instead of to church? What is more important, fishing or visiting with God in His house? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 2:41-49

Let's pray: We know how much we need to hear and learn Your Word, dear God. Please help us to love it, understand it, remember it, and do it. Forgive us for not always loving You and Your house above all things. Help us to gladly go to Your house whenever we can. In Jesus' name. Amen.



Are You Growing as a Christian?

When Rosa was not quite two years old, people would ask her, "How big are you?" Rosa would raise her hands up high and say, "So big." Now that Rosa is grown up, she doesn't say that anymore.

When our bodies are as tall as they're meant to be, we say we have stopped growing. But there are some ways in which we can keep growing. Peter, one of Jesus' disciples, says in our Bible verse, "Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

What does it mean to "grow in grace"? What is grace, and how can we grow in it?

Grace is the wonderful love of God. Peter wants our faith in this love to grow and grow. To another group of Christians the apostle Paul wrote, "We . . . give thanks to God . . . because your faith is growing abundantly" (2 Thessalonians 1:3). *Faith* is believing that God loves us and that He forgives our sins and makes us His children. Peter wants us to learn to trust God's love more and more.

To grow in grace, we must grow in another way. We must learn to know Jesus better all the time. Only people who know Jesus know how good He is to them. That's why Peter also said we should grow in knowing our Lord.



Let's talk:

When do people say they have stopped growing? What does our Bible verse tell us to keep growing in? What is grace? How can our faith in God's love keep on growing? In what ways can we learn more about Jesus?

Older children and adults may read:

2 Thessalonians 1:2–12

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we want to keep on growing as Christians. Please help us grow in grace by leading us to learn more about Jesus, our Lord and Savior. In His name. Amen.



Where God Is

It was a lot of fun to drive to the mountains. The trip took Stephen and Ryan far away from home. First the boys counted cars. Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 145:18-21

Let's pray: Thank You, dear Lord, for loving us and hearing our prayers no matter where we are. Please forgive us all our sins. Thank You for being with us always, when we're at home or when we're away. We pray this in Jesus' name because we belong to Him. Amen.



Why Not Ask?

The apples on the neighbor's tree looked very good to Erin. But she knew they didn't belong to her. "I wish I could have one of those apples," Erin told her dad.

"Why don't you ask Mrs. Harris if you may have one?" asked her dad.

"I don't know," said Erin. "I'm afraid to talk to her." Erin was very shy.

"Your apples look very pretty, Mrs. Harris," Erin said.

"Do they?" Mrs. Harris replied. "Would you like some?" Erin nodded her head.

Erin didn't wait long. She hurried over to Mrs. Harris's yard to get some apples. She could have had them sooner if only she had asked for them.

God listens when we pray, and God answers the prayers of His children. Don't be afraid to ask God for things. He loves us for Jesus' sake. He will give us whatever is good for us.



Let's talk:

What did Erin wish she could have? What did her dad tell her to do? How did Mrs. Harris show that she liked Erin? Do you think God loves His children as much as Mrs. Harris liked Erin? Suppose we ask God for something He doesn't want us to have. How would God answer our prayer? What are some gifts God is always willing to give us?

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 11:5-10

Let's pray: Thank You, dear God, for telling us to ask You for whatever we want. Teach us to trust that You will give us what You know is best for us. We especially ask You for a strong faith in Jesus, our Savior, and for Your Holy Spirit to fill our hearts. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

It is [God] who makes the clouds rise at the end of the earth, who makes lightnings for the rain.

Psalm 135:7



How Strong God Is!

One day James noticed how strong his dad was. When Mom couldn't open a jar of pickles, she called Dad. He opened it. A little later his brother, Robert, couldn't get the screen out of a window. But Dad got it out easily. Then the faucet leaked, and Dad fixed it.

The next day, James went next door to play with Christopher. "My dad is strong—he can do anything," James told Christopher. Did knowing his dad was strong make James afraid? No, it made him feel good.

When you hear thunder and see lightning, remember that God makes the thunder roll and the lightning crack. Remember, too, that God is your Father in heaven. Your heavenly Father sends the lightning with the rain, says the Bible.

The next time you see God's lightning and hear His thunder, think about how strong and great God is. James said his father could do "anything." James was wrong. Only our Father in heaven can do anything—anything He wants to do. And He wants to do only what is good for us. We're His children, and He loves us very much.

Do we ever have to be afraid of lightning? No. It shows us how strong and great our God is. Think of that when you see the lightning. And remember how wonderful it is that you are one of God's children.



Let's talk:

When does God usually send lightning? Why are some people afraid of lightning? What does lightning tell us about God? Does God want to scare us with thunder and lightning? Can God keep the lightning from hurting us? How do we know that God loves us? What can we do if we become afraid in a thunderstorm?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 135:5-7

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, only good things come from You, so lightning must be good for us. Whenever there's lightning, help us remember how strong You are and how happy it makes us that we are Your children. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



You Shall Not Covet

A man watched a zookeeper feed a monkey. The zookeeper put the monkey's food on the floor of the cage. The monkey was all alone, but it must have been afraid another animal would take some of the food. The monkey grabbed the food as fast as it could. It stuffed three bananas into its mouth and put an apple under each arm. Then the monkey grabbed a loaf of bread in one hand and a bunch of carrots in the other.

There was a big piece of lettuce left on the floor. The greedy monkey put down the carrots, picked up the lettuce, and put it on its head. Then the monkey picked up the carrots again and went to a corner of the cage. The monkey wanted all the food. It was selfish. But the monkey couldn't eat because its mouth was full of the food it was holding.

Jesus said, "Be on your guard against all covetousness." To be greedy, or to covet, means to be selfish, to want things for yourself.

To show how foolish and wrong it is to covet, Jesus told a story about a rich man who wanted to get richer. He kept building bigger and bigger barns so he could keep more and more for himself. But he never thanked God, and he never helped others. When the selfish rich man wanted to start enjoying everything he had collected, God took his life away.

Jesus said a person's life does not depend on what things he or she has. Remember this the next time you think you must have something to be happy. Wanting things often makes people unhappy. The only thing we need to be happy is Jesus' love, and we have that all the time. That's why God's children can be unselfish.



Let's talk:

How did the monkey show it was greedy and selfish? When does a person covet? What story did Jesus tell to show how foolish it is to covet? What is the only thing we need to be happy?

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 12:15-21

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, please teach us not to covet things or to be greedy. Give us those things we need and lead us to use Your gifts and blessings for the good of others. In Your name, Amen.



Practicing Your Lessons

Two girls were playing on the floor as their mother entertained some guests. Everyone was at the dinner table, ready to start eating.

Mom said to the girls, "Please come to the table. We're ready to eat." But the girls paid no attention to her, not even when she said it two more times.

One of the dinner guests was the girls' Sunday School teacher. She asked the girls, "I wonder which of you can finish this Bible verse: 'Children, obey . . . '"

Both girls quickly answered, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right" (Ephesians 6:1).

The verse told the girls to obey their mother, but they still *didn't* obey. What was wrong?

The girls were *hearers* of the Word of God but not *doers*. They knew the words, but they didn't *do* what the words said. Knowing the words didn't help the girls, did it? They needed to *do* what they had learned.

God wants us to put into practice the words of the Bible. The words won't change us and help us until we do what they say. The apostle James writes, "Be doers of the Word, and not hearers only."

The first thing God wants us to do is to believe in Jesus. When we believe in Jesus, we also want to obey Him.



Let's talk:

What did Mom tell the girls? What did the girls do? How did their teacher try to help? What Bible verse did the girls know? Why didn't the words help? What is the first thing God wants us to do?

Older children and adults may read:

James 1:22-25

Let's pray: Dear Lord God, we're thankful for Your wonderful words in the Bible. We want to hear and learn them. Help us not only to remember them but also to do what they say. Remind us that as we obey Your words, we show our love for Jesus, who died for us. In His name we pray. Amen.



The Way to Love Everyone

Shelly was very nice to people when she was in public. But at home she was often mean to her little brother. Shelly could be so kind to people at church, but she was not always kind to her mother.

Sometimes we can be difficult to get along with, especially at home. Sometimes we forget to do things. Sometimes we feel mean. But when we remember how kind and good Jesus is, we want to be kind and good also. And when we remember that Jesus died to save us, we find it easier to be friendly to other people. Loving Jesus makes us more like Him.

Jesus said, "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:27). He even told us to love our enemies. Jesus always loved. We often don't. But that's why He paid for our sins on the cross. "If God so loved us, we also ought to love one another."

Don't you think your home is a good place to practice loving others? People could tell what kind of girl Shelly really was by the way she acted at home. If we love Jesus, we will want to be kind in public and especially in our home.



Let's talk: To whom was Shelly nice? To whom was she mean? Why should we show love, especially to those we live with? From whom can we learn to be kind? How did Jesus pay for our sins? What does our Bible verse say we should do because God loves us?

Older children and adults may read:

1 John 4:10-12

Let's pray: Dear God, we know that You love us even though we are not always loving to others. In fact, You loved everyone in the whole world when You sent Jesus to save us all. Help us love those around us and forgive us when we forget. We ask this for Jesus' sake. Amen.





Why the World Is So Pretty

Mei Ling and her father were walking along a path near the river. At one spot Mei Ling saw some flowers she had never seen before. "Look how pretty those flowers are," exclaimed Mei Ling. "There are so many colors."

As they walked a little farther, Mei Ling saw some wild strawberries. She picked a few and showed them to her father. "Look how pretty these strawberries are," she said. "They're like a red ice-cream cone on green leaves."

Then Mei Ling noticed the round stones by the side of the river. They had been washed smooth by the water. She picked some up to take home. "Look how they shine," she said. "Red and yellow and lots of other colors all mixed up."

Thank God All You Can

When Kenji blew his whistle, it was loud and clear. But when he blew it with all his might, it was even louder.

When Kenji ran, he ran fast. But when he ran as fast as he could, he ran really fast. Whatever Kenji did with all his might, he really did well.

In Psalm 103, King David wrote about thanking and praising God. He wanted to remind himself to bless God with everything in him. "Praise the LORD, O my soul" (Psalm 146:1), he wrote, "All that is within me, bless His holy name!"

How would Kenji praise God with everything in him? He would do it just as well as he could, with everything he's got. When King David wrote, "All that is within me, bless His holy name," he meant, "I want to thank God with everything in me."

When somebody gives Kenji a cookie, Kenji says, "Thank you." But when somebody gives Kenji ice cream covered with strawberries, he gets excited and says, "Thank you. Thank you very much. Thanks a lot!"

Some people thank God a little now and then for things He gives them. But those who remember how God forgives their sins and is good to them every day thank Him with everything that's in them.



Let's talk:

When Kenji blew his whistle as loud as he could, how did it sound? When Kenji ran with all his might, did he run faster or slower? What did King David remind himself to do in our Bible verse? Why did King David want to praise God as much as he could? When we appreciate how much God loves us and provides for us, how will we praise and thank Him?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 103:1-5

Let's pray: If we had a thousand voices, dear God, we would want to use them all in thanking and praising You. Thank You for sending Jesus to die for us. We praise You for being kind and good to us instead of punishing us as we deserve. Please forgive all our sins for Jesus' sake. Amen.



God's Business

Some children went to the zoo with their Uncle Mark. They saw the lions and the elephants and the monkeys and the camels.

All at once the children knew they were lost. They could not see Uncle Mark anywhere. They didn't know where the car was. They didn't know which way the gate was.

While looking around, they saw a sign that said, "Information." Courtney went up to the woman who sat below the sign. Everybody was asking her questions. Courtney didn't really want to bother her, but she had to. She said, "I wish I didn't have to ask you for help, but . . ."

"Go ahead and ask," said the woman. "It's my business to help you. That's what I'm here for." She told the children which way to go, and soon they found Uncle Mark waiting for them by the gate.

Sometimes people think they shouldn't bother God with all their little troubles. They think God may have too many other things to do.

What do you think God would say to children who feel they shouldn't tell Him about something that bothers them? In the Bible, God speaks to us the way the woman in the zoo spoke to Courtney. God says, "Go ahead and ask for help. I am your God. I will help you."

God wants to help us. He loves to do it. Nothing is too small for Him. Nothing is too big for Him. God says, "Don't worry. Don't ever be afraid. I am your God. I will help you."



Let's talk: Why didn't Courtney want to ask the woman for help? What did the woman say? In what way is our Father in heaven like the woman who helped Courtney? How big must a trouble be before we can ask God for help? How big can it be? Why is God willing to help us?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 12

Let's pray: Thank You, dear Father in heaven, for promising to help us at all times. We don't deserve to have You as our God, but we're glad You are. Keep us as Your children for Jesus' sake. Amen.



Joseph and the Mouse

One day a mouse came to Joseph. The mouse was very worried. At first Joseph didn't see the mouse. He was busy figuring how much wheat he had left to feed all the people. He had mountains of wheat, much more than enough. Then he heard the mouse squeak.

"What are you worried about, Mouse?" asked Joseph.

"I'm worried that you won't have enough wheat for me," said the mouse.

Joseph laughed. There was enough wheat to last the mouse a million years or more.

That story was told by Mr. Spurgeon, a great preacher who lived in England. Mr. Spurgeon went on to say that one day he was worried about his troubles. He didn't think that everything would come out all right. Then he read the Bible and came to the verse where God says, "My grace is sufficient for you." That means God's love and grace is enough to help us with every problem.

When Mr. Spurgeon read those words, he laughed. He laughed at himself. He was being as foolish as the mouse that came to Joseph and worried that there wasn't enough wheat.

Do we ever have troubles? Yes, but none of our troubles are too big for God to handle. No matter how much trouble we may have, no matter what we need, God's grace and love can take care of us.

Remember what God said: "My grace is sufficient for you."



Let's talk:

What was the mouse worried about? Why did Joseph laugh? That story isn't really true, but what does it teach us? Why did Mr. Spurgeon laugh one day as he read the Bible? Is God's grace big enough to take care of our troubles? To whom does God give His grace?

Older children and adults may read:

1 John 5:11-15

Let's pray: Dear God, we know that Your grace is big enough to take care of all our troubles. Forgive us when we don't trust You. Help us remember that all we need is Your grace. Please give us this for Jesus' sake. Amen.

"I don't have to be scolded by my sister," said Ross. "She's not my boss."

"No, she isn't your boss, and she shouldn't talk like one," said Mom. "But I don't hear her talk that way very often."

Grieving the Holy Spirit

"Mom, when I sin, am I still a child of God?" asked Cara. She was very worried.

"What makes you ask?" her mom questioned.

"Because I made up my mind never to be angry again, but when Drew splashed mud on my new dress, I got real angry at him," Cara said. "I can't always do only what's right."

"Nobody knows where we are. Nobody can help us," cried Jenna.

In the days when the prophet Nahum lived, God's people were often afraid of their enemies. But Nahum told them not to be afraid. He told them to ask God to help them and to depend on Him. He said the Lord cares for those who trust in Him.

What are people afraid of today? Some are afraid of criminals, some are afraid of not having a job, some are sick and afraid they won't get well. God's words in the Bible remind us that He hasn't forgotten us. We know that God won't forget us. We are His children and trust in Him. "The LORD is good. . . . He cares for those who trust in Him." He will hear our prayers and answer them.



Let's talk:

Why were God's people afraid in the days of Nahum? What did God tell them? What are people afraid of today? What does God tell us? What does "trust in the Lord" mean? Why can we always trust that the Lord will help us? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 91:1-2, 14-16

Long ago, when the prophet Elisha lived, the king of Syria found out that Elisha was telling his secrets to the king of Israel. Elisha knew the secrets because God told them to him. The king of Syria sent a large army to get Elisha. They came during the night and surrounded the city where Elisha was staying.

The next morning, when Elisha's helper got up, he saw the army surrounding the city. He was very afraid. He went and got Elisha and said, "Look! There are enemy soldiers all around the city. They've come for you. What should we do?"

"Don't worry," Elisha said. "There are more soldiers on our side."

Then Elisha asked God to allow his helper to see the army of angels in the hills. God opened the helper's eyes. He saw that the enemy army was surrounded by horses and chariots of fire.

Angels are spirits. That's why we can't see them. But they help all God's children, and God sends them to help us, too. What do they do? On some days they may keep things from falling on us and hurting us. On other days they may keep us from walking in front of a car or a bus.

We don't know everything that angels do because we can't see them. But the Bible says, "He will command His angels . . . to guard you in all your ways." That means they watch over God's children. Aren't you glad?

Older children and adults may read:

2 Kings 6:8-17

Let's pray: Dear God, our Father in heaven, You give us so many good things that we can't see. We thank You for them. We especially thank You for the good angels who help and guard us. Send them to watch over us every day, for Jesus' sake. Amen.



God Wants Us to Be Thankful

Some children whine and cry when they can't have their way. Because they're not thankful for good food to eat, they're so skinny and weak that they just barely squeak. When it's time for a good sleep, they stall and bawl. Something is wrong with them.

God wants His children to be happy. That's why He tells us to be thankful. When we're thankful, we're happy. People who aren't thankful aren't happy.

Asha was never satisfied with anything. She didn't like the clothes her parents gave her to wear. She didn't like the food her parents cooked for her. She never wanted to do what she was asked to do. Was she happy? No. She was a very unhappy girl.

The Bible says to be thankful. Just think—God loves us. He forgives all our sins for Jesus' sake. We are His children, and someday Jesus will take us to heaven. That's why we can be thankful in everything. And when we are thankful, Jesus is glad and we're happy.



Let's talk: Why was Asha a very unhappy girl? What does our Bible verse teach us? Why does God want us to be thankful? What are some reasons why we can always be thankful?

Older children and adults may read:

Colossians 3:15-17

How to Treat Mean People

"You're ugly and stupid," Illita said to Lissa.

"Perhaps, I am," said Lissa, "but you're very nice in many ways."

Illita was surprised. Then she looked up and smiled. "You really aren't ugly and stupid," Illita said. Then the girls were friends again.

Suppose Lissa had become angry and said mean words back to Illita. Do you think they would have gotten into a big argument?

Lissa wasn't stupid or dumb. She knew how to avoid an argument and stay friendly. She was bright and sweet.

Jesus told us to do what Lissa did. When somebody says mean things to us, we should say kind things back to them. "Bless those who curse you," Jesus said.

God's children are to treat others kindly even when those people aren't nice to us. They want to do this because it's how God acts. When people say they don't like God or they don't believe in God, God doesn't take their food or shelter away. God is kind and good even to those who don't love Him. His Son, Jesus, died on the cross so *everyone* could have forgiveness.

If God can be kind to those who are mean to Him, why should we refuse to be kind to those who are mean to us? Jesus wants us to bless those who curse us. God's children should be nice even to those who say hateful things.



Let's talk:

What did Illita say? What did Lissa say? Who said the nicest words? How could Lissa have gotten even? How does God treat people who don't love Him? What does Jesus want us to do when people hate us and curse us? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 6:27-31

Let's pray: Dear God, You are good and kind even to those who don't like You. Help us treat others with kindness. Help us say nice things even to those who say mean things to us. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



The Hardest Words to Say

Suppose you and your friends played with matches and started a fire. Would everybody say, "I did it," or what would you all say?

But it's good for us to say, "I have sinned." When we say these words to God, He forgives us for Jesus' sake.

Michael and Paige were looking at the berries in their neighbor's garden. They knew it was wrong to pick the berries, but they stood there and looked at them. The more Paige and Michael looked, the more they wanted those berries. Before long they were picking some to eat. They were stealing because they were taking something that didn't belong to them.

What could Michael and Paige have done? They could have walked away or gone inside and finished their chores, or they could have played with their friends. They could have avoided the temptation by moving away from the berries.

Because of Jesus' great love, we want to avoid sin. Sometimes walking away helps. But the best way to avoid sin is to ask Jesus to help us do what is right.

The little girl prayed to Jesus to take away her sin. Then she went downstairs and told her mother she was sorry she had lied about the dish. After that she went back to bed and fell asleep. Jesus gave her rest.

"Mommy, I'm stepping in your steps," said her daughter, Kali. She was following, trying to step right where Mommy's steps were in the snow.

When Mrs. Sutherland noticed what Kali was trying to do, she took smaller steps. When Kali became tired, she carried her the rest of the way.

Children like to do what their parents do. Because we believe in Jesus, we're God's children. We want to do what Jesus did. The Bible tells us that Jesus left us an example that we should follow in His steps.

But aren't Jesus' steps too big for us to follow? Yes, they are, if He doesn't help us. But He became a baby and grew up like any other boy. He lived on earth for us and made His steps small so we could follow them. And He died on the cross to pay for the wrong steps we take.

When do you follow the steps of Jesus? You follow Jesus when your mom or dad ask you to help with the dishes, and you think, "Jesus would do it," and then you help. You follow Jesus when you see your friend's baseball glove lying out in the rain and you pick it up because that's what Jesus would do. Whenever we try to do what Jesus would do, we are following in His footsteps.

Remember, Christ left us an example that we should follow in His steps.

Caitlyn came home from playing with her friends. "Mom, I will never talk to Lana again. She said I was dirty," Caitlyn said with a determined look on her face.

For several days, Caitlyn bore a grudge against Lana. She kept those hurt feelings inside and wouldn't even speak to Lana.

But bearing a grudge is wrong. It's like hating somebody. God doesn't want us to hate. He wants us to love. What would happen if God hated us when we sinned? What if God wouldn't forgive us? Then we would never get to heaven.

But God loves us even though we sin. He sent Jesus to die for us. Because God loved us that much, we want to find ways to love others, too, even if they aren't always as nice as we want them to be.

When Sheep Get Lost

Mr. Keck was a rancher. He had many sheep. When they were eating grass, they behaved very well. But if one of them walked away from the place they were eating, they all wanted to walk away.

Once one of the sheep saw a hole in the fence and went through. So did the next sheep, and the next one, until all the sheep had gone through the hole.

Fluffy, a particularly frisky lamb, went through the hole too. When the neighbor's dog started barking, the sheep became afraid. The Right Highway

The first time Mr. Devon tried to drive to Highland, he came to an intersection. One highway turned right; the other went straight. Which one should he take? He didn't know.

He looked at the signs at the intersection. One sign said: "Highland—2 miles," and it pointed to the right. Then he knew which highway to take.

Our whole life is like a highway. Sometimes we don't know which turn to take.

Tara went to a store. She wished she could buy some candy, but she didn't have any money. The check-out person was in the back helping someone. Tara could have taken some candy. We could call that way the "Stealing Street." But Tara didn't turn down that road. She didn't take the candy; she stayed on the "Honest Highway."

Enrique was asked to go to a picnic, but his mother got sick and needed his help at home. His mother told him to go to the picnic. "But Jesus would want me to help you, Momma," said Enrique. Enrique stayed home. He didn't take "Me-First Highway." He turned onto the "Street of Love."

In the Bible, God tells us which highway to take. He wants us to take the highway of the upright. The upright are those who trust in the Lord and do what is right. And the highway of the upright avoids evil. To live correctly, we also must turn away from whatever is wrong.

The Right to Eat

A professor had a pile of stones in one corner of his yard. A homeless person came to his door one day and asked, "Would you please give a hungry man something to eat?"

"I'll be glad to," answered the professor. "If you'll move that pile of stones into the other corner of my yard, I'll give you a meal for your work."

The homeless person didn't want to work. So the professor didn't give him anything to eat.

The professor kept the stones to test people's willingness to work. Every time a needy person came to his house, the professor asked the person to move the stones in exchange for a meal. Those who worked, ate; those who wouldn't work didn't eat.

Maybe there are better ways to test a person's willingness to work, but the professor was trying to live by the Word of God: "If a man will not work, he shall not eat."

Every child of God wants to be useful. We won't be useful if we don't learn to work. When children are small, they can't do much. Children have a lot of time to play, but they can begin to do little things. They can pick up their toys and help around the house. As they grow older, they are able to do more. If they learn how to work, someday they may have an important job.

God wants us to learn to be good workers. If someone is too sick to work or there is no work for them to do, we should be glad to help them. But if anyone is not willing to work, they don't have the right to eat.



Let's talk:

Why did the professor ask needy people to move the pile of stones? Can people be useful and helpful if they don't want to work? Why does God want His children to learn to work? What great work did Jesus do to make us God's children?

Older children and adults may read:

2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we're glad You want us to be workers because we want to do things for You. Please make us good workers who are glad to be useful and helpful. Thank You for sending Your Son to work for us. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen.



Where Sins Come From

Donzell had a dream. He dreamed that all his sisters and brothers, his father and mother, and all the neighbors could see everything he was thinking. Even when he thought something that was bad, everybody could see it. In his dream, he ran away because he didn't think anybody would love him anymore.

Donzell was glad when he woke up and realized it was only a dream. It was bad enough to think bad things, but to have people see them would be terrible. He was glad that no one could really see what he was thinking.

Would you like it if people could always see what you were thinking? All of us think bad things sometimes. All the bad things we do come from our thinking. Why do we say mean words? Because we first think and feel them. Why do we do mean things? Because we think of doing them.

Jesus said, "Out of the heart come evil thoughts." And when we think wrong, we do wrong. Jesus forgives our wrong thoughts and deeds and wants us to think only good things. He will help us do it.



Let's talk

Why did Donzell want to run away? Why would you not want everyone to see what you're thinking? How many people are there who never think bad things? Where does our wrong thinking come from? Who washes away our sins and cleans our heart?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 15:18-20

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, please take away all the bad and mean things we think and do. Make our hearts clean and our thinking right by giving us Your Holy Spirit. We ask this for Jesus' sake, who died to save us. Amen.





A Poor Rich Man

Naaman, a general who had fought against God's people, went to the prophet Elisha to be healed from a disease called leprosy. Elisha told Naaman to wash in the Jordan River seven times. When Naaman believed and obeyed, God healed him. Naaman returned to Elisha and wanted to give him some gifts. But Elisha didn't want Naaman to think God expected something in return for healing him, so he refused the gifts.

Later, Gehazi, Elisha's helper, ran after Naaman. He told the general that Elisha had changed his mind and wanted some money and some clothes for some new students. Naaman gave Gehazi some money and two sets of clothing. Gehazi hid these in his house.

But Elisha knew what his helper had done. When Gehazi returned to Elisha, the prophet asked him, "Where were you, Gehazi?"

Gehazi lied and said he hadn't been anywhere. But Elisha knew he had lied and told him, "From now on you will have Naaman's sickness." Suddenly Gehazi's skin became as white as snow from leprosy. It didn't pay for Gehazi to lie.

Do we get sick when we tell lies? No. God doesn't send sickness to punish us. God sent Jesus to take the punishment for our lies and for all our other sins. Because Jesus loves us so much, we want to say only what is true.

It would have been better if Gehazi had stayed poor and honest instead of becoming rich and a liar. That's what God says in our Bible verse, "A poor man is better than a liar."



Let's talk:

What is so bad about telling lies? Why did Gehazi tell Naaman a lie? How was Gehazi punished by God? How many people in the world have never told a lie? For whose sake is God eager to forgive us? Why will we want to keep from lying?

Older children and adults may read:

2 Kings 5:20-27

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we're glad that everything You have said is true, especially Your promises of forgiveness and love. Help us say only what is true. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen.



Singing to the Lord

Karissa was feeling sad. So what did she do? She started to sing. "Count your blessings, name them one by one, and it will surprise you what the Lord has done," she sang.

Then Karissa counted what the Lord has done for her. "I have a good home while many people lost theirs in a hurricane," she said. "I have clothes and shoes; a cute baby brother; and so many other things. Best of all, I have Jesus as my Friend and Savior, and I know that God loves me.

"Count your blessings, name them one by one," she continued singing. Soon she wasn't sad anymore.

Did you ever sing to the Lord when you didn't feel well? It helps you feel thankful and happy.

Do you ever feel that nobody loves you? Sing "Jesus Loves Me." It will remind you that you always have a best Friend who loves you no matter what. Try singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" to remind you how special His friendship is. When you're worried about something, sing "I Am Trusting You, Lord Jesus." It will remind you that Jesus is always ready to help you.

While you wait for Sunday School or church to begin, memorize verses to your favorite songs. Then when you need them, you'll have them in your mind so you can sing them.

People who know and love God say, "I will sing to the LORD as long as I live." They're happy when they think of how much God loves them.



Let's talk:

What did Karissa do when she felt sad? Why does singing help us feel better? What other hymns do you know? Why do we want to sing to the Lord as long as we live? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 105:1-5

Let's pray: Thank You, dear Lord, for Your wonderful love that comforts us when we are sad and puts a song in our hearts. When we sing our thanks and our joy to You, accept our prayers for Jesus' sake. Amen.



Learning God's Way

Amy asked her dad to go to Sunday School and church with her.

"No, I'm staying home," her dad said. "You can go if you want to. You go your way, and I'll go mine."

"Dad, which way are you going?" Amy asked.

Dad grunted, but he didn't answer. He thought about Amy's question for a long time.

At breakfast the next morning Trent found \$10 on his plate. There was also a note that said:

Trent owes Mom:

For three good meals a day	Nothing
For washing his clothes	Nothing
For taking care of him when sick	Nothing
For a good home and lots of love	Nothing
For teaching him	Nothing
Total	Nothing

How do you think Trent felt when he read his mother's note? He probably was ashamed of what he had written. The Bible says, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." This means that it's better to give than to get. Giving makes us happier than getting.

Did you ever notice how unhappy people are who always get everything and never learn to give? People who share what they have and try to help others are happy people. Jesus came to give everyone His love and help. He even gave His life to save us all. That's why He is such a wonderful Savior. We show Jesus how thankful we are for His good gifts when we give to others instead of just getting.



Let's talk:

How did Trent try to get some extra money? What was his mother giving Trent for nothing? What does the Bible verse say about giving? Which people are happier—those who give or those who receive? What did Jesus give to all people when He died on the cross? Why does giving make us happy?

Older children and adults may read:

Acts 20:32-38

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, we're glad that You have given us Jesus as our Savior. Help us to be happy by giving instead of only trying to get things. For Jesus' sake we ask this. Amen.



How to Be Friends with Jesus

Dillon came into the house crying. "C. J. isn't my friend," he sobbed.

"Why isn't C. J. your friend?" asked his mom.

"Because she won't do what I tell her," said Dillon. Dillon had wanted C. J. to go to the store with him, but she wouldn't.

Most of the time, C. J. did what Dillon wanted and Dillon did what C. J. wanted, and they were good friends. But when C. J. didn't do what Dillon wanted or when Dillon didn't do what C. J. wanted, they weren't friends. The more they did for each other, the better friends they were.

That's what our friendship with Jesus should be like. Because Jesus loved us so much that He died for us to make us His friends, we want to do the things He asks us to do. Jesus said, "You are My friends if you do what I command."

What does Jesus want us to do? He wants us to obey His commands in the Bible—obey our parents, help others, be honest, don't hurt others with our words or actions, and believe that He is our Savior from sin.

Just before Jesus said the words in our Bible verse, He also said, "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12). That's especially what He meant when He said, "You are My friends if you do what I command."



Let's talk:

How can you tell when two people are very good friends? How does Jesus want His friends to treat one another? How does the Holy Spirit help us do what Jesus commands us to do? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

John 15:4-8

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, we want to be Your friends and Your followers. Please forgive us when we don't do what You command us to do. Help us do those things You want us to do so everyone will see that we are Your friends. In Your name. Amen.

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 22:39-43

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, thank You very much for doing Your Father's will so we could be saved. Help us say, "Your will be done," and really mean it. We love You. Amen.



God Protects His People

Before there were guns and airplanes, people liked to build their cities on mountains or very high hills. These cities were safer from enemies than those built on flat ground.

King David built the city of Jerusalem on a hill that had mountains surrounding it. This city was extra safe because even a few soldiers could stop a big army from coming too close. Soldiers protecting the city could fight in places between the mountains where only a few enemy soldiers could get through at a time.

David thought of how God protects us like the mountains protect Jerusalem. He wrote about how safe God's people are when they trust Him. "As the mountains surround Jerusalem, so the LORD surrounds His people," King David wrote.

But the mountains didn't always save Jerusalem. When the people in Jerusalem became wicked, God allowed enemies to come and burn the city. As long as the people believed and loved God, God protected them.

God can protect us even when mountains can't. Because we belong to Jesus, nothing can hurt us. God always takes care of His people.



Let's talk:

How did mountains protect people long ago? Why did King David think that God was like the mountains? Why couldn't the mountains keep the people of Jerusalem safe when they were wicked? Why are God's children always safe? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 125

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, with so many dangers around us, we need You to protect us like a mountain. Keep us in Your loving arms so we will be safe from all harm and danger. In Jesus' name. Amen.



How Can We Be Strong?

"I can't do it. I just can't do it," exclaimed Matthew as he walked into the house.

Was he thinking of a girl whose father carried her over some water? God's care is like a father's arms.

Was he thinking of an eagle? The mother eagle flies under her young eagles while they are learning to fly. If they fall, the mother eagle catches them on her back and flies them safely back to the nest.

The everlasting arms under us are God's arms. We can't see God's arms, but God tells us that nothing bad can happen to His children because "underneath are the everlasting arms."

God's arms are everlasting—they never get tired, they're never too weak to help us, and they're always under us.

Demond was playing ball in his backyard. He stepped on some flowers his mother had just planted. "I didn't know I was doing it," said Demond when his mother called to him. His mother saw that Demond really didn't know he was trampling her flowers, so she forgave him.

When Jesus was ready to die for us, some soldiers took Him and nailed Him to a cross. They had to do it; their officer told them to do it. But they didn't know that it was their Savior they were nailing on the cross. They didn't know that Jesus was their Lord and God.

Then the man who sells all those good things comes out of the store. He waves to the boy and other people who are passing by. He says, "Hey, everyone who is thirsty, come and get a free drink; and if you have no money, come anyway and buy and eat!"

The boy can't believe it! But he is thirsty and hungry, and it sounds good; so he runs over and says he would like some milk. "I don't have any money," he says. The man gladly gives him all the milk he wants.

Then the boy points to some bananas, and the man sticks three in the boy's pocket. The man also gives the boy a loaf of bread, some cookies, a quart of ice cream, and all the apples he can carry.

That isn't what most store owners would do. But it is what God does. One day God's prophet Isaiah said, "Come, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and he who has no money, come, buy and eat!" Isaiah was thinking of the good things God has for us and how we can have these good things without paying for them. In the Bible, God invites everybody to come and enjoy His gifts without paying for them.

Do you know what the water and bread are that God wants us to buy from Him without money? His love and the forgiveness of all our sins. For Jesus' sake, God wants to give us His love free—for nothing! All we need to do is believe what He has told us in the Bible. It's almost too good to believe, isn't it?



Let's talk

How do you think the hungry boy felt when he was given free food? What are the bread and water God wants us to have? How much do we have to pay for God's love? Who may have God's love and blessings? How can anyone get God's gifts without paying for them?

There's something Jesus told His disciples twice. That must mean He really wants us to do it. Jesus said "Love one another" two times in one conversation. In between Jesus said, "You are My friends if you do what I command" (John 15:14).

Why did Jesus say "Love one another" twice? Perhaps because Peter would sometimes get angry with Philip, or Nathanael would argue with Thomas. Sometimes the disciples were even jealous of one another. They needed to be told twice.

We often argue with one another at home or at school. We get angry very easily. We say bad words to each other. Sometimes we even hit or kick or do other mean things. Do you know what Jesus wants us to do? He said, "This is My commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you."

How much did Jesus love us? So much that He died for us on the cross. That's how much we should love one another. That's quite a lot, isn't it? Would you be willing to die for someone else? Jesus died for all people. He died to save us from our sins. He wants us to love the way He loved us.

What is the command Jesus gave to His disciples? Why do you think Jesus said these words twice? Who needs to remember that God wants His children to love one another? How much should we love one another? How much has Jesus loved us?

Older children and adults may read:

John 15:12-17

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, we're sorry that we haven't loved one another as much as we should. Please forgive us and help us to love others as You have loved us. In Your name we pray. Amen.

God's love is for those who fear Him. Who fears God? The word *fear* in this sentence doesn't mean to be *afraid* of God. It means to love God and be afraid of sin. And those who fear God and are sorry for their sins discover that God's love is very great—always big enough to forgive them.

Let's pray: How wonderful is Your love, dear God, and how great! Help us fear You in the right way—to love You so much that we will never want to sin. When we do sin, please forgive us for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Do you know what kind of song book Jesus used? He used the Book of Psalms. The psalms are poems. Many of these poems were sung as hymns. One of them begins and ends with these words: "Praise the LORD, O my soul." What do you think that means?

"Praise the Lord" means we should give God all the honor and glory and thanks He deserves. The psalm tells why we want to thank and praise God. The main reason is that He forgives all our sins and loves us and provides everything we need.

Who should praise the Lord? The psalm says that our souls should. What is the "soul"? Suppose a doll maker made a doll just as big as you, one that looked just like you. What would the difference be between you and the doll? The doll isn't alive. It has no soul.

My soul is me while I'm alive; your soul is you while you're alive. When the psalm writer said, "Praise the LORD, O my soul," he meant that he would thank and praise the Lord with his whole heart and life.

Jesus deserves to be thanked and praised. He saved us from being punished for our sins. He died for us on the cross and rose from the grave so God can forgive all our sins. He loves us as a father loves his children. And someday He will take us to heaven. "Praise the LORD, O my soul."

"Right again," said Dad. "What does the Bible say is the only way to get to heaven?"

"That's easy," said Kathy. "We can only get to heaven by believing that Jesus is our Savior. The Bible says, 'Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved' "(Mark 16:16).

Some Words Are Like Medicine

"I'm a doctor," said Elaine. "Grandma said so."

"Why did she say you were a doctor?" her mom asked.

"Grandma said, 'When you come, it's like good medicine.' I tell her funny stories, and it makes her happy," answered Elaine.

"Maybe you are a good doctor for her," said Mom. "I know a Bible verse about pleasant words. It says that 'Pleasant words are a honeycomb, sweet to the soul and healing to the bones.'

"In another place," her mom continued, "the Bible says, 'A glad heart makes a cheerful face,' and 'A joyful heart is good medicine' " (Proverbs 15:13, 17:22).

Pleasant words *are* like good medicine. When people feel sad and you say something friendly, it cheers them up and makes them feel better.

A grouchy woman was cleaning rooms in a motel. One of the guests told her, "I'm glad you keep things so clean. You do your work quickly, too."

The woman smiled. "I don't hear things like that very often," she said. For many weeks those words were like good medicine for her. They made her feel good.

Saying something pleasant to another person is one of the easiest ways to share Jesus' love with those around us.

Older children and adults may read:

Proverbs 16:23-29

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, Your words are like honey, sweet and good, and ours are often like vinegar. Help us make the hearts of other people glad by the things we say, especially by telling them about their Savior, Jesus. We ask this in His name. Amen.



How to Walk in Love

Kareem and Jacob were strolling down the street together. They started pushing each other off the sidewalk in fun. But soon Jacob began to get angry. He saw a new lawn a little farther down the street. It had just been planted and soaked with water, so it was muddy. As they walked past it, Jacob pushed Kareem into the mud.

Now Kareem became angry. He threw mud at Jacob. Jacob began to call his friend names. Kareem chased Jacob down the street, threatening to give him a black eye. The two boys weren't friends anymore.

If Jesus had been walking as a boy with Kareem and Jacob, what would He have done? Maybe He would have pushed playfully too. But He would have watched to see if His actions made His friends angry. And if anyone began to get angry, He would have stopped what He was doing. He would not have pushed Kareem into the mud.

What would Jesus do? That's a good question to ask as we walk through life. The Bible says, "Live a life of love, just as Christ loved us." Our whole life is a walk with Jesus to heaven. On the way, we sometimes forget to walk like Christians. We need to remember that Jesus is walking right beside us. We can ask Him to help us do the things He wants us to do.

"Live a life of love, just as Christ loved us," says the Bible. How did Jesus love us? Jesus gave up His life for us on the cross so God would forgive us and make us His children. When we love as Jesus has loved us, He helps us forget about ourselves and do things for others.



Let's talk:

If Jesus had been with Kareem and Jacob, what would He have done? What happened when Kareem and Jacob stopped living in love? What does it mean to "live in love"? What has Jesus done for us? Why did He do it? Because of Jesus' love, how much can we love others?

Older children and adults may read:

Ephesians 5:1-2

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, please walk with us every day on our way to heaven. Help us learn from You how to walk in love. Forgive us when we forget. We ask this as Your children and followers. Amen.



Let's See What You Believe

Mr. Wilkey came out of a bar, half drunk, and stumbled into his pastor. "Mr. Wilkey, do you think you're a Christian?" Pastor Link asked.

Mr. Wilkey got angry. He took off his coat and was going to fight Pastor Link. "I'll show you I'm a Christian," Mr. Wilkey said.

Is fighting a way to show others that you're a Christian? No, the more you fight, the less people will think you're a Christian. Christians are people who believe in Jesus and love Him. They have faith in Jesus. They believe that He is their Lord and Savior. They trust in Him. Jesus lives in their hearts.

But how can you show your faith? How can you prove that you believe what you say you believe? How can you see whether other people have Jesus in their hearts?

James, one of Jesus' disciples, wrote in the Bible, "I will show you my faith by my works." We show what we believe by what we do. Jesus said people will see that we are His disciples if we love one another.

Suppose you saw someone who didn't have enough clothes and had nothing to eat, and you had extra clothes and extra food. Suppose you said to that person, "I love you. I hope you get some clothes and food." If you didn't give that person anything, would he think you really loved him?

James said, "I will show you my faith by my works." He meant that people will be able to see whether we really love them by what we do. And our actions also will show whether we love Jesus.



Let's talk:

Older children and adults may read:

James 2:14-18

What Jesus Wants Us to Be

Have you ever seen a courtroom? A courtroom is a place where judges try to find out the truth about people the police catch.

There's a judge in a black gown who sits behind a desk on a platform. There's the person who was arrested. There's a police officer. There's usually a witness or two to help tell about what happened. There are lawyers asking questions.

Jesus said that His followers should be like one of those five kinds of people. Do you know which one? Jesus didn't say we should be police officers, making sure people obey the rules. Jesus doesn't want us to be judges who punish people. Jesus didn't say we should be lawyers who question people. And He certainly doesn't want us to be people who break the rules.

Jesus said, "You will be My witnesses." Witnesses tell what they know. Some people believe them, some people don't, but that doesn't matter. Witnesses just tell what they know.

As His witnesses, what does Jesus want us to tell others? He wants us to tell people what we know about Him. He wants us to tell everyone that He died and rose again to save us from our sins. Some people we tell will believe; some won't. Whether they believe or not is not up to us. Only the Holy Spirit can work faith in a person's heart. Our job is to be witnesses for Jesus.

Have you ever told someone else about Jesus? Remember that Jesus wants you to be a witness for Him. Watch for a chance to speak up for Him every day.

Older children and adults may read:

Acts 1:7-9

And then He rose again on Easter.

How wonderfully good our God is. That is why the psalm writer also says, "Praise the LORD, O my soul" (Psalm 146:1).




Let's talk:

God Listens to His Children

Have you ever been in trouble, bad trouble, when you didn't know what to do?

King David had many troubles. Before he became king, David had to run away from King Saul, who was trying to kill him. Later David had to run away from Absalom, his own son. Absalom tried to get rid of his father so he could be the king.

Usually our troubles come from our sins. When we tell a lie, when we break something, when we treat others unkindly, when we forget to do something, we get into trouble. Some of King David's troubles were his own fault too.

But sometimes we get into trouble even when we haven't done anything wrong. Maybe somebody gets sick, or we lose our money, or we trip and fall, or someone treats us unkindly. There are many different kinds of troubles in the world.

What can we do when we're in trouble? We can pray to God. We can say what King David said. He said, "Answer me when I call, O God of my righteousness! . . . Be gracious to me and hear my prayer!" (Psalm 4:1).

King David knew God would help him. He said, "The LORD hears when I call to Him." So he prayed to God often, and then he stopped worrying.

We know that God loves all people, especially His children. We, too, can say, "The LORD hears when I call to Him." Remember to ask God for help when you're in trouble. He will help you for Jesus' sake.



Let's talk:

What did King David believe the Lord would do for him? What kinds of troubles do children have sometimes? What kinds of troubles do grown-ups have? Why can we ask God for help in times of trouble? Why are we happier when we trust God?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 4:3-8

Let's pray: Dear God, we're glad You are willing to help us in any trouble. We thank You for Your promises to hear our prayers. We know You will help us for the sake of Jesus, our Savior. Amen.



Why Terrell Didn't Worry

"I don't know what we'll do this week," Terrell's father said at the supper table. "I won't get paid until Friday, and we don't have any money for food."

"Jesus can help us," said Terrell. "Jesus once made a boy's lunch feed a lot of people."

"You're right, Terrell," said Mom. "Let's ask Jesus to help us."

So Dad led the family in this prayer: "Dear Jesus, please help us get enough food this week."

Later that evening the telephone rang. It was the man who owned the convenience store on the corner. "I wonder if you could use some cans of food," he said. The man knew that Terrell's family was very big.

"I had some cans outside and didn't notice that it started to rain," the store owner said. "The labels came off the cans, and I don't know what's in them. I can't sell them like that. Could you use them?"

"Could I use them?" Dad said excitedly. "You're the answer to my prayer."

"Trust in the LORD," said Mom when she learned about the store owner's offer. "Jesus always finds a way to help us when we depend on Him."

We can always be sure that Jesus can and will help us. "Trust in the LORD," the Bible says. To trust means to believe He will do what He has promised.

Let's pray: It's wonderful to know we can always depend on You, dear Jesus. Please help us remember this, especially when we're in trouble. We thank You and love You for saving us from sin, our worst trouble. Keep us in Your kingdom and bless us. Amen.



The Best Helper in the World

"Who helps God when He needs help?" Caleb asked his dad.

"God never needs help," Dad answered. "God can do anything. He's the almighty Maker of heaven and earth. If He needed anything, He could make it just by wanting it."

"Oh," said Caleb. After thinking a moment, he said, "Then God can always help us."

Caleb was right. Sometimes we ask our parents for something, but they can't help. When Caleb was sick, he asked his dad to help him get better. Caleb's dad could only give him medicine and stay with him until he felt better. But God made Caleb better. God can always help us. He can do anything. He made heaven and earth.

The Bible says, "My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth." Psalm 121 also says that the Lord never sleeps and that He watches over His children and keeps them from harm.

That's why the psalm writer said, "I lift up my eyes" (Psalm 121:1). He meant that he looked up to heaven—to God—for the help he needed. And he knew the Lord, who is in heaven, would help him.

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, we're glad we are Your children. For Jesus' sake, love us and keep us with You. Teach us to trust in Your help. In Jesus' name. Amen.

"Am I thankful!" Mrs. Andrews said. "My son was driving on Banner Road when he fell asleep and drove down a steep bank. The car rolled over twice, but he wasn't hurt. Isn't it wonderful how God kept him from harm?"

"Yes, it certainly is," said Miss Collier. "God certainly protected your son, but He keeps us from harm every day."

"How's that?" asked Mrs. Andrews.

"I drive on Banner Road at least 10 times a week," said Miss Collier. "I've never fallen asleep while driving. I've never run down the bank and never wrecked the car. Don't you think that's even more wonderful?"

Mrs. Andrews smiled. "I guess we forget about God's care until we have an accident like my son had," she said. "We really need to thank God when we don't have problems or accidents."

Our Lord Is Mighty

A big storm blew across the lake. A strong wind whipped huge waves over the boat. Water poured into the boat faster than the men could scoop it out. Jesus was asleep at one end of the boat. His friends woke Him. "Lord, save us!" they said (Matthew 8:25). They thought they were going to drown.

Jesus got up and talked to the wind and the water. He told them to be quiet. Right away the wind calmed down, and the water quit splashing. The friends of Jesus were surprised. They said, "What kind of man is this? Even the winds and the waves obey Him!"

Just think—Jesus can tell the wind to be quiet and it quits blowing. He can tell the thunder to quit rolling or the rain to quit falling or the fire to quit burning or the sickness to quit hurting. Everything has to do what Jesus tells it to do.

If Jesus can make these things go away, why doesn't He chase away all our troubles? Often we don't ask Him to do so. And sometimes when we ask Him, He has a better plan or a better time to do what we ask.

A man once prayed to Jesus and asked Him to help him catch a plane. When the man arrived at the airport, the plane was gone. Later that day, the man learned the plane had crashed. The man was glad he'd missed the plane.

Jesus can do anything—He's God. Doctors said Sarah would never get better. Sarah said this prayer to Jesus: "I'm willing to be sick, if You want me to be sick, dear Jesus. But if it will be good for me, please make me well. The doctors don't think I can get better, but I know You can take away the sickness."

Jesus did make Sarah better. The doctors were surprised.



Let's talk:

What was the wind doing on the lake? Who was in the boat? Why did they wake Jesus? What did Jesus tell the wind? What happened when Jesus told the wind to be still? What can Jesus say to our troubles? Why doesn't Jesus always take away our troubles? When will He take all our troubles away?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 8:23-27

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, help us believe that You have power over all things. Teach us to pray to You in times of trouble. Because You know what's best for us, we ask that Your will be done and not ours. We know that You love us, and we love You. Amen.



The Best Thoughts

"I asked God for sunshine on my birthday, but it's raining," said Ben. "Why didn't God answer my prayer?"

"Ben, that question reminds me of a story," Mom said. "Two boys dug up some ground one day. One planted a garden, and the other collected some worms. That night the boy with the garden prayed for rain. The other boy prayed for sunshine so he could go fishing. What do you think God did?"

"I don't know," said Ben.

"Don't you think it would be better if we asked God for what we want and then be thankful for the answer He decides is best?" Mom asked. "Maybe other people needed rain on your birthday. God doesn't always think the way we think. He doesn't always do what we want, but His ways are always best."

"'My thoughts are not your thoughts,' . . . declares the LORD." He has much better thoughts than we do. We don't always forgive people who treat us unkindly. We get mad and maybe want to get even. Or we just quit being friends with that person.

But God thinks a lot differently than we do. He sent Jesus, His only Son, to die for our sins and rise again on the first Easter. Because of Jesus, God gladly forgives our sins. We can be glad that God doesn't think the way we do.



Let's talk

Whose ways of thinking are always better than ours? How do we think we should treat others who sin against us? What is God's way of treating us? For whose sake does He love us? Where can we find out what some of God's thoughts are? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Isaiah 55:6-9

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, forgive us for not always believing that what You do is best. We know that You love us and all Your thoughts are good. Help us remember that we are Your dear children, for Jesus' sake. Amen.



What Jesus Can Do for Us

When Jesus was alive, leprosy was something no one could heal. Persons with the disease had to leave home and live with others who had leprosy. They couldn't be around people who didn't have leprosy. People with the disease had to beg for food. Often they lived in caves or small huts and waited to die.

One day a man found out he had leprosy. He cried. Then someone came and told the man, "Jesus has been healing people with leprosy and has been doing many other wonderful things. People say He's the Son of God and the Savior God promised to send."

The man with leprosy believed that Jesus could help him. He hoped Jesus would come to his town. Maybe Jesus would heal him. Otherwise he would never be healed.

One day the man heard that Jesus was coming to his town. The man stood as close to the town gate as he dared. He waited. At last Jesus came. There were a lot of people with Him. The man with leprosy ran to Jesus, nearer than the law said he could. He knelt down in front of Jesus and said, "If You are willing, You can make me clean."

Jesus felt very sorry for the man. He even touched him. Nobody had touched him for a long time because people were afraid of catching leprosy. As Jesus touched him, He said, "I am willing . . . Be clean!"

Immediately the spots of leprosy were gone! The man's skin became smooth and clean, and he was healthy and strong again.

We don't have leprosy, but we do have something much worse—the sickness of sin. And no one can take away the sin in our hearts except Jesus. Like the man with leprosy, we can say to Jesus, "Lord, I'm sinful, but You can make me clean." Then Jesus says, "I forgive you; be clean!" Jesus washes away our sins. Then He helps us live a new life of faith in Him.

What disease did the man in the story have? What did he do when Jesus came to his town? What did he say to Jesus? What did Jesus tell the man with leprosy? What happened to the man's disease? What kind of sickness do we have? What can Jesus do for us? How do we know that He will help us?

Older children and adults may read:

Mark 1:40-45

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, we all have the sickness of sin, but You can make us clean. Take away all our sins so someday we may be with You and all of God's children in heaven. Amen.



How to Treat Others

"You know what I wish?" Alika said to her mother. "I wish somebody would give me a whole pocketful of quarters." She liked candy bars, and she knew they cost 50 cents.

"Do you know the Bible verse that's called the Golden Rule?" Alika's mother asked. "It says something about how you want others to treat you."

Alika knew the verse. "You mean the one that says, 'So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them'? Does that mean I have to give away a pocketful of quarters to get more?"

"No, that Bible verse isn't really talking about quarters," said Mom. "Jesus was telling His disciples about how important it is to think of others first. That is one way we can share His love."

"I guess I was being selfish wanting a whole pocket of quarters all for myself," Alika said. "Maybe I could share the dollar I already have with Jennifer. She never gets to buy a candy bar."

"Now I think you know what that verse means," Mom said as she gave Alika a hug.

Where to Get Forgiveness

Once there was a teacher who kept a little black book. In it she put a mark every time she saw a child do something wrong. Some of the children had a lot of marks in this book. At the end of each week, those who had marks were punished.

If God kept a book like that, how many marks do you think we would have? We'd have so many we couldn't count them. In a way, God does keep a book like that. He sees and remembers everything we do. The Bible calls God's memory a "book."

How do we get rid of the marks against us? There's only one way. The Bible says, "With [God] there is forgiveness." God sent His Son, Jesus, to take the punishment for all our black marks. He died on the cross and rose again. When Jesus did that, it was as if God erased all the marks by our names.

There is forgiveness with God—plenty of forgiveness for everybody's sins. Isn't that wonderful? Jesus paid for all the sins of everybody in the whole world. That's why there is forgiveness with God for every sin in the whole world.

Many people think they have done things that can't be forgiven. That isn't true. Judas betrayed Jesus, but he could have been forgiven. Pilate told the soldiers to nail Jesus to the cross. Was Jesus willing to forgive Pilate? Yes, He was. Peter said he didn't know Jesus. Did Jesus forgive him? Yes, He did. We've done many wrong things, too, and Jesus forgives us.



Let's talk:

What did the teacher do? If God did that, how many marks would we have? What does God do with our marks? Why? How many sins will God forgive? Are any sins too bad to be forgiven? Why are we glad that God forgives every sin?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 130:1-8

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we believe that You forgive our sins just as You told us. That's why we're happy even though we have many marks against us. Thank You for sending Jesus to suffer and die for us. Help us do what is pleasing to You, for Jesus' sake. Amen. A soft answer turns away wrath. Proverbs 15:1

"A soft answer turns away wrath," the Bible says. Wars have been started because leaders have said angry words instead of gentle ones.

At one time the people of Israel were about to fight against two of their own tribes. Those two tribes had built a large altar by the Jordan River similar to the altar in the tent church. The other ten tribes of Israel thought these two tribes were starting their own religion.

Before fighting, the leaders of the ten tribes sent some men to ask the two tribes why they weren't worshiping God anymore. The two tribes explained gently that they weren't worshiping another god. They were only trying to help their children remember the true God. That was a gentle answer. It stopped the war.



Let's talk:

How do we usually answer when somebody yells at us? If the two tribes of Israel had answered, "Mind your own business," what might have happened? How did Jesus answer His enemies when He was hanging on the cross? How would you answer if someone said, "You're a liar"? Why is a gentle answer better than an angry answer? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

1 Peter 2:21-25

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, forgive us for becoming angry. Help us to be kind and gentle, like Jesus, who didn't use angry words when people made fun of Him. In His name we pray for a heart that is willing to give gentle answers. Amen.



More Wonderful Than Soap

Let's pray: Thank You, dear Lord Jesus, for dying for us on the cross. Forgive what we have done wrong today. We're glad You wash away all our sins. Please keep our hearts clean by helping us not to sin. Amen.



Two Reasons for Being Happy

"I'd rather lose my eyes than my ears," said Rory. "As long as I had my ears, I could hear people talk. They could tell me everything, and I could talk back to them. I could also listen to the radio."

"I'd rather lose my ears than my eyes," said Jenna. "As long as I could see people or flowers or my dog or what's around me, I'd be happy."

Rory and Jenna discussed ears and eyes for a long time. Both said it's good to have eyes and good to have ears. And those who have both have two good reasons for being thankful to God.

The Bible reminds us that "the hearing ear and the seeing eye, the LORD has made them both." Only the eyes God makes can see, and only the ears God makes can hear. People can make imitation eyes, but they can't see like a real human eye. And people can make imitation ears, but they can't hear like a real human ear.

A blind man would be very thankful if he could see. A deaf woman would be happy if she could hear. If we can hear and see, we can be doubly happy and thank God.



Let's talk:

If you couldn't have both, which do you think it would be better to have, eyes or ears? Why? What's the difference between an imitation eye and the eye God makes? What kind of ear can't we make? How would people who were blind or deaf feel if they suddenly could see or hear? What reasons do we have for being thankful and happy?

Older children and adults may read:

Proverbs 20:11-15

Let's pray: For our wonderful eyes we thank You, dear God. We thank You also for ears that can hear. Please forgive us if we have used our eyes and ears for sinful seeing and hearing. Help us use them only for what is good. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.





The Captains of Our Home

He especially wants parents to teach their children that Jesus is their Savior. Then when children forget to honor their parents, they know they can ask God for forgiveness.

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we know that we don't always honor our parents. Forgive us for Jesus' sake, and help us to do Your will. Amen.

Where do our sins go when they're forgiven? Who forgives them? Why is God willing to forgive our sins? In the Lord's Prayer, how do we ask for forgiveness of sins? What are some of the sins God washes away?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 51:1–3, 9–11

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, we're ashamed of our many sins, and we're sorry. Please wash us and make us clean for Jesus' sake. Amen.



Don't Lose Your Temper

Seiji could get angry so easily! When some little thing did not suit him, he would stamp his feet. He would scream. He would even roll on the ground.

As Seiji grew older, he still had a bad temper. If people didn't do what he wanted, he said mean things or pouted and planned ways of hurting people to get even.

Seiji noticed that his little brother, Akeno, did not get angry easily. "Seiji, why can't you be more gentle and kind?" his mother would ask. "I'm glad Akeno doesn't get so angry." That made Seiji angry with his brother.

When a person is angry with someone for a long time, it's called hate. Long ago there were two brothers, Cain and Abel. Cain began to hate Abel. One day the two were out in a field. Cain became so angry that he killed his brother. What started as hatred turned into murder.

God tells us in the Bible, "You shall not hate your brother in your heart." God wants us to love, not to hate. He wants us to be like Him. The Bible says, "God is love" (1 John 4:8).

God loved the whole world very much. He sent His Son, Jesus, to die for the sins of all people—even for those who hate their brothers or kill other people. Jesus suffered and died because He loved us. Jesus said, "A new commandment I give to you that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34–35).



Let's talk: Why is it a sin to hate someone? Why did Seiji often become angry? Who do you think was happier, Seiji or Akeno? What happened when Cain became angry? When we feel ourselves getting angry, what would be a good thing to do?

Older children and adults may read:

Genesis 4:3–8

Let's pray: Heavenly Father, please forgive us for getting angry so easily. Keep us from losing our temper and hating those around us. Make us loving and kind, more like Jesus, every day. In His name. Amen.



Doing the Best You Can

A man named Simon had invited Jesus and His disciples to his house for dinner. It was just a few days before Jesus died on the cross.

While they were eating, a woman named Mary came into the room. She was carrying a little jar of very expensive perfume. She wanted to show Jesus how much she loved Him. She stood next to Jesus and poured the perfume on His head. The smell of the perfume went all through the house.

A disciple called Judas scolded Mary. "Why has this perfume been wasted?" he asked. "It might have been sold, and the money could have been given to the poor." Some of the other disciples agreed with Judas.

Mary thought this was the best way she had to show how much she loved Jesus. When Jesus heard Judas scold Mary, He said, "Leave her alone. Why do you trouble her? She has done a beautiful thing to Me" (Mark 14:6).

Jesus didn't want Mary to feel ashamed of what she had done. He appreciated her gift of love.

Aren't you glad that Jesus looks at the reasons people do things? Sometimes we try to do something good and it seems to turn out all wrong. But when Jesus knows we have done something out of love for Him, He's pleased. He says "You have done the best you could."



Let's talk:

What did Mary do for Jesus? Why did some of the guests scold her? What did Jesus say to them? Why was Jesus pleased with what Mary had done? What does Jesus think of the things we do out of love for Him?

Older children and adults may read:

Mark 14:3-9

Let's pray: We're glad You were so kind to Mary, dear Jesus, and that You look at the reasons we do things, not just what we do. Help us give You our best as a thank You for loving us. We love You, as Mary did. Amen.



What You Can Do to Get Even

Rocks were flying. People were throwing them at a man named Stephen for saying he believed in Jesus. The rocks hit his chest; they hit his face and his back. Pretty soon he would be dead.

Just before Stephen died, he prayed. Did he ask God to punish his enemies? No! He said, "Lord, please don't punish them for this sin." When he had said that, Stephen died.

Stephen prayed for his enemies. Where had he learned to do that? He learned it from Jesus. When the soldiers were nailing Jesus to the cross, Jesus didn't hate them. Instead, He prayed for them and said, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34).

That's the way Jesus wants us to treat people who aren't nice to us. Can you remember this Bible verse: "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you"? The next time you feel angry at someone, try doing what Jesus did: Pray for the person.



Let's talk:

What happened to Stephen because he said he believed in Jesus? What did he do for his enemies? From whom did Stephen learn this? When did Jesus pray for those who were mean to Him? Why is it hard to pray for someone we don't like? Who helps us pray for our enemies?

Older children and adults may read:

Acts 7:54-60

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, we know how much You love us—enough to forgive us for the many things we do wrong. Help us forgive and pray for those who do wrong things to us. Amen.





Jesus Will Keep His Word

"Yes, I will build you a house," the carpenter said. But he fell from a roof and died. His words were forgotten. He didn't build the house as he had said. He couldn't keep his word.

"Yes, I will sell you a car that won't give you any trouble," said the salesman. But his words didn't come true. A few months later, the car gave the new owner a lot of trouble. The salesman's promise wasn't any good.

Many of our words pass away too. We can't keep all our promises. But Jesus said, "My words will never pass away." The words of Jesus will come true, no matter what happens.

When Jesus says, "I will forgive your sins," we can believe it. He will do it. When Jesus says, "I am with you," we can believe it. It's really true. When Jesus says, "I will give you eternal life in heaven," we can believe it.

Jesus keeps all His promises. That's what He meant when He said, "My words will never pass away." Isn't that good news?



Let's talk:

Why couldn't the carpenter keep his promise? What happened to the salesman's promise? Whose words will never pass away? Why are we glad about that? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

John 10:27-30

Let's pray: Lord Jesus, how happy we are to know that Your words will never pass away, especially Your wonderful promises. Help us keep them in our minds and hearts so we won't forget them. Thank You for promising that You will always keep Your word. Amen.



Where Love Comes From

"Julaine is very good about taking care of Andrew. They seem to love each other very much," said Mr. Schroeder to Julaine's dad.

"God wants us to love each other, doesn't He?" Julaine asked her father after Mr. Schroeder had gone home.

"Yes, Julaine, He does," answered Dad. "I know a Bible verse that says exactly that: 'Let us love one another, for love is from God.' "

Julaine repeated the verse. She wanted to remember it. She said it a few more times so she wouldn't forget it.

"All love comes from God," explained Dad. "And anybody who doesn't love, doesn't know how God thinks and feels. But those who love have God in their hearts, and they know what God is like. You know how much God loves us, don't you, Julaine?"

"Yes," Julaine said, "God showed how much He loves us by sending Jesus to die for us. My Sunday School teacher told me that."

The Bible says, "Since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another." (1 John 4:11, NIV). Those who have Jesus in their hearts love one another because He is full of love.

Why Jesus Died

When Jesus was hanging on the cross, the people who hated Him didn't feel sorry for Him. They made fun of Him and dared Him to come down from the cross. Although Jesus' enemies were laughing at Him when they said it, one thing they said was true. "He saved others," they said, "[but] He cannot save Himself."

That's exactly why Jesus stayed on the cross instead of coming down. Jesus could have saved Himself. But if He had, then He would not have saved us. To save others, Jesus couldn't save Himself. To save you and me from God's punishment for sin, Jesus had to stay on the cross and die in our place.

You can think of it another way. Once there was a great flood. A family sat on the roof of their house, waiting to be rescued. A rescue worker came by in a little boat. It had enough room for all but one. If everyone tried to get in, the boat would sink. "Save my family and leave me here," said the father. To save the others, he couldn't save himself.

There is a story about a hen that sat on her nest in some dry grass. Ten baby chicks were under her wings. The grass was burning all around her. The hen could have flown away and saved herself, but then her chicks would have burned. The hen stayed on the nest. Her feathers burned, and she died, but under her were the chicks, safe and alive. She had saved them. That's why she couldn't save herself.

The Bible says that Jesus died for us to save us. That's why His enemies told the truth when they said mockingly, "He saved others; He cannot save Himself."



Let's talk:

Who made fun of Jesus as He was hanging on the cross? What did they say? In what way were their words true? In what way were their words not true? Why couldn't the father save himself? Why couldn't the hen save herself? Do we owe Jesus anything for saving us instead of Himself?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 27:38–44

Let's pray: Thank You, dear Lord Jesus, for staying on the cross. Thank You for saving us when You could have saved Yourself. Make us willing to help others learn what You have done for them. Amen.



Does God Love Bad People?

"You aren't supposed to do that," Benjamin said to his little sister, Heather. "When you do that, you're bad, and God doesn't love bad people."

Was Benjamin right or wrong?

He was very wrong. Everybody does wrong things, but God loves us even when we aren't good. What He doesn't love are the bad things we do.

The Bible says that God loves the whole world. God loved all people so much that He gave them a present. It was the best present He could give. He gave His Son, His only Son, to the world. He did this when He sent Jesus to be everybody's Savior.

God gave His Son, Jesus, to every person who ever lived or who will live in the world. God wants all people to believe in Jesus and live with Him in heaven.



Let's talk:

What did Benjamin say about God? Why was he wrong? How did God show that He loves the world? Who is included in "the world"? Who works faith in Jesus in our hearts? What does Jesus do with all sins? What does Jesus promise to all who believe in Him?

Older children and adults may read:

John 3:14-17

Let's pray: Thank You, dear God, for loving the whole world and all people in it even though they sin. Please forgive us when we're bad. Help us live the way You want us to live. Thank You for sending Jesus to be our Savior and make us Your children. In His name. Amen.





What He Did Counts for Me

Latoya was crying softly. She was sitting on her bed in her pajamas, looking in her Bible at a picture of Jesus nailed to the cross.

"Why are you crying?" Daddy asked.

"They put nails through Jesus' hands and feet," said Latoya as she brought the book to her daddy. "He let them do it to Him because He loves us."

"Yes, Jesus loved us that much," Daddy said. "He was willing to be hurt so we wouldn't be punished for the bad things we do."

"Like when I hit Anika?" asked Latoya. Anika was her sister.

"Yes. Or when you don't listen to your mother," Daddy answered.

Latoya climbed up on her daddy's lap and hugged him. "I love you very much, Daddy," she said. "But Jesus loved us even more, didn't He?"

How to Keep from Sinning

"Don't stay in the kitchen, Kayla," said her mom. "As long as you see the cake, you'll want to taste it."

"I don't want to eat the cake. I just want to look at it," Kayla said.

"Rather than stare at the cake, let's learn a Bible verse," Mom said. "The verse says, 'Give no opportunity to the devil."

"Margaret says there isn't a devil," Kayla told her mom.

"Well, Jesus said there is, and He wouldn't tell us something that isn't true," Mom said. "In fact, Jesus was even tempted by the devil. The devil tries to make us do wrong, but he can't if we don't give him a chance. That's why the Bible says, 'Give no opportunity to the devil.' It means, don't let him have any place around you or in you."

Kayla thought for a minute. "When I stay near the cake, am I giving the devil a place where he can get me to do wrong?" she asked.

"I'm afraid so," said Mom.

Did Jesus stop teaching and run to see His mother? No, He didn't. What He was doing was more important than talking to His mother. He was teaching the Word of God.

Jesus wanted the people to know how important the Word of God is. So He said, "Who is My mother and who are My brothers?" Then He pointed to His disciples and said, "Here are My mother and My brothers! For whoever does the will of My Father in heaven is My brother and sister and mother" (Matthew 12:48–50).

How many people could be brothers and sisters and mothers of Jesus? That's right—all of us could. When we believe in Jesus and are baptized, Jesus, our Savior, makes us God's children. Then we are sisters and brothers of Jesus.



Let's talk:

Who came to see Jesus one day? What was Jesus doing? Why didn't He quit teaching and talk to His relatives? Who did He say were His brothers and sisters and mother? Who makes us Jesus' brothers and sisters?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 12:46–50

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, thank You for making us children of God and Your brothers and sisters. Help us to obey our Father in heaven in all things. Amen.



Some Troubles Are Good

"They caught Cody stealing," Rasheeda told her mother. "I'm glad. That's good for him."

Rasheeda wasn't being nice when she said those words, but in one way, she was right. It turned out to be a good thing Cody was caught stealing.

A police officer at the station talked to Cody for a long time. "If you'll let Pastor Hiller help you, I'll give you another chance," the officer said. "Every day you have to phone or see Pastor Hiller. You need to tell him where you are and what you're doing. And you have to go to church and Sunday School."

Cody promised to do as the police officer said. Cody and Pastor Hiller became good friends. Pastor Hiller reminded Cody often that he was one of God's children.

Make-Believe Gods

Dawn wanted a little sister. But God didn't give her a little sister. So Dawn put a dress on her biggest doll and said, "This is my sister, Brittany." But she was pretending. Only God can make a sister. Nobody can make a sister out of a doll.

Many years before Jesus lived on earth, the people of Israel loved the Lord God and were His children. But people in the countries around Israel made their own gods. They made a person or an animal out of a stone or a tree and called these statues their gods.

These gods were pretend gods. But the people thought they were real. They even prayed to them. Dawn knew better than that. She couldn't make a real sister, so how could anyone make a real god?

Today many people still make their own gods. In India and Africa and Japan and even in the United States, children pray to gods who really aren't gods. Sometimes people don't pray to a person or an animal, but they love something more than God. What are some things people love? Money, houses, cars, television, candy, and many other things. We make these things our gods if we love them more than we love the real God.

Do we love God more than anything else? He is the one real God who loves us. That's why He is first and last and most important in our hearts.



Let's talk:

How did Dawn make a sister? What are some things people might love more than God? Who is the only real God who ever was or ever will be? Who should be most important in our lives?

Older children and adults may read:

Isaiah 44:1-6

Let's pray: We are glad, dear God, that You are our God and that You always will be. We want nobody else but You for our God. Forgive us for not always loving You more than anything else. Help us trust in You above all things. In Jesus' name. Amen.



How to Get Clean on the Inside

King David was feeling very bad. He had sinned. He had taken the pretty wife of one of his soldiers. Then he had gotten rid of the soldier by putting him in the front of a battle. There the soldier was killed, as David had hoped.

For a while David pretended that he hadn't done anything wrong. He wouldn't even tell God he was sorry.

But God sent the prophet Nathan to David. "God has been very good to you. Why have you done this great sin?" Nathan asked. "You killed Uriah and have taken his wife to be your wife. A lot of trouble will come to you now. Because God's enemies are making fun of what you have done, your child will die."

Now David knew that God had seen what he had done, and he was very upset. "I have sinned against God," David cried. What could he do?

David asked God to take his sins away. "Please feel sorry for me, dear God," he said. Then the Holy Spirit helped David write a poem others still use to ask God for forgiveness. It's Psalm 51 in the Bible.

In Psalm 51, King David begged God to forgive his sins. "Create in me a clean heart, O God," he said. He knew that only God could wash away the wrong he had done. For seven days and nights the king prayed. He wouldn't even eat.

King David was punished, as Nathan said he would be. But because he begged God to wash his sins away, God forgave David.

"Create in me a clean heart, O God." That's a prayer everyone needs to say because so often we think and say and do what isn't right. Every sin is like dirt in our hearts, and only God can make our hearts clean. He does this when He forgives all our sins for Jesus' sake.



Let's talk

What sin did King David do? What did the prophet Nathan tell him? Which psalm, or poem, did King David write after Nathan talked to him? What did David beg for in this psalm? What does "create" mean? How does God make our hearts pure and clean?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 51:10-12

Let's pray: Create in me a clean heart, O God, by washing away all my sins for Jesus' sake. Amen.



Smile before Sundown

Stephen and Troy were working in a factory. Stephen bent down to pick up a hammer. When he straightened up, he hit the back of his head on a board. Troy laughed. That made Stephen very angry. Without thinking, he hit Troy with the hammer. Troy died. Stephen had killed his best friend.

Not all anger is wrong. God gets angry at sin. Remember how angry Jesus was when He chased the money changers out of the temple? We need to be angry about sin. God wants us to get rid of sin in our lives.

But anger is a difficult emotion to control. It's so easy to get angry with people and to get angry without a good reason. When we get so angry that we want to hurt people, we don't love them. God wants us to love even our worst enemies.

Many people can't stop being angry with others. In our Bible verse, Paul tells us we shouldn't let the sun go down on our anger. This means, if we do become angry about something, we should ask God to help us solve the problem before the end of the day. Anger that keeps on burning inside of us turns into hate, and hate is even more dangerous than anger.

Remember Cain and Abel? Cain was jealous and angry because God was more pleased with Abel than with him. Cain let his anger grow day after day, and soon it turned into hate.

Ask Jesus to help you forgive and forget so the sun won't go down on your anger. Jesus will help you follow His example and love everyone—even your enemies.



Let's talk:

What did Stephen do to Troy? Why did he do it? Why is anger so dangerous? Why shouldn't we get angry at people? If we are angry day after day, what does our anger become? What does Paul say in the Bible verse?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 6:12-15

Let's pray: Our Father in heaven, You are very patient and slow to get angry. Help us to be like You. Make us kind and gentle, like Jesus, and teach us to become angry only at sin. When we become angry with people, help us get over it before the sun goes down. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



We Are Never Alone

Juanita was crying. The older children had gone to the river to swim, but Juanita was too young to go along—she had to stay home. That's why she was crying.

"I'm all alone," Juanita told her mom. "Nobody's here to play with me."

"Why don't you come and help me bake a cake?" asked Mom.

Juanita wiped her tears and went into the kitchen. Mom helped her measure out the flour and mix it with milk and butter and sugar and other ingredients. It was fun to help Mom. Soon a big smile spread across Juanita's face.

"I'm not alone now," she said, "not when I'm with you, Mom."

God's children are never alone. God is always with them. And God is always everywhere. Sometimes we feel all alone and sad or sick and worried. Sometimes we think nobody loves us, and then we feel horribly alone. But we're never alone. Jesus said, "I am with you always."



Let's talk:

Why was Juanita crying? Who made Juanita smile? How? Why are we never alone? Why do we sometimes feel sad and lonely? To whom can we speak when we feel alone? In how many places is Jesus at the same time?

Older children and adults may read:

John 16:28-33

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, we're glad You are always with us, even when nobody else is near. Help us remember that You are always with us, that You love us and are always ready to help us. Please forgive our sins and remind us always of Your love for us. Amen.





Our Lord Is Never Proud

A man on horseback rode up, stopped, jumped off his horse, and helped the soldiers. Then he turned to the corporal and said, "Why didn't you help them?"

"Me?" asked the corporal. "I'm an officer!" He was too proud to help the common soldiers work. He was too proud to help his men.

Do you know what the rider said as he swung up onto his horse? "The next time you need help on work you're too proud to do, call George Washington." The corporal almost fainted. Now he knew the man who helped was the general in charge of all the soldiers.

Do you think Jesus would have helped the men? Or would He have been too proud to help, like the corporal? Jesus wasn't too proud to do anything that needed to be done to help *us*. He wasn't too proud to help His parents. He wasn't too proud to go to school. He wasn't too proud to work.

Jesus was not ashamed to have poor people as His friends, not even when other people called them sinners. He loves all of us although He is great and we are nothing. Although Jesus is God, He wasn't too proud to suffer and die for us.

That's something we can learn from Jesus. "Learn from Me," He said, "for I am gentle and lowly in heart." To be lowly or humble means you don't think you're better than anyone else. Jesus helps us learn to be humble.



Let's talk:

Who was too proud to help his soldiers? Who was humble enough to help the soldiers? How did Jesus show that He isn't proud? What does Jesus say in our Bible verse? How can we learn to be humble?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 11:28-30

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, we're glad You weren't too proud to be a baby and a man to save us. Thank You for being willing to die for us on the cross. Teach us how to be humble in heart as You are. Amen.

Kirk felt sorry he had told Mrs. Olandra about Nola. He knew it might not be true. He wanted to tell Mrs. Olandra that he wasn't sure Nola had stolen the money, but Mrs. Olandra hurried inside her house and closed the door.

Through the window, Kirk could see Mrs. Olandra talking on the phone. She was probably telling Mr. Samson what she had heard about Nola.

By telling a lie, Kirk had probably cost Nola two jobs! He'd also spoiled the good thoughts people had about Nola. That's how much harm one little lie can do.

Lies hurt the people who tell them, the people who hear them, and the people about whom they are told. They make people think wrong things. We should even be careful about lying for fun. Sometimes these lies can hurt our friends and cause a lot of problems.

You lie when you aren't completely honest with people or when you try on purpose to make people believe what isn't true. God says, "Put away falsehood, let each one of you speak the truth." Liars don't follow Jesus' example of always telling the truth. They don't treat others as they want to be treated.

God promises to give us much more than we can ever give to Him when we think of Him first. After all, everything we have comes from God. We can trust His promise to provide for all our needs.

Help us remember that we should give You the first part as a thank You for the blessings You give us. We ask this in the name of Jesus, our Savior. Amen.



Jesus Wants to Shine in Us

Everybody who came to church one evening got a candle. After the sermon, the lights were turned off. The pastor lit his candle. "Will the ushers please light their candles from mine?" he asked. They did.

As the ushers went back down the aisle, they lit the candles of the people sitting at the end of each bench. These people lit the candles of those sitting next to them and so on. Soon the whole church was bright with candlelight. It all started from one candle.

The pastor told the people what it meant. "The whole world is like a dark place," he said. "People are lost and can't see the way to heaven. People are also afraid in the dark and often do wrong things.

"But Jesus is like a bright light that is always burning," the pastor continued. "When we believe He is our Savior, He begins to shine in us.

"When Jesus shines in us, we become lights, too. We get our light from Him," the pastor said. "Then we can help light up the darkness around us. We can show people the way to heaven. We can tell them that Jesus is their Savior. We can show them the way Jesus wants us to live."

Are you a light in the world? You are —because Jesus lives in you. He shines in your heart. And when others see that you love Him, they may come to love Him, too.



Let's talk:

Older children and adults may read:

John 9:1–7

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, many people around us don't know You. They can't see that You are their Savior, and they don't love You. Please shine in our hearts so we can help show others how wonderful You are. Amen.

"Mercy sakes!" said Holly. She had heard the lady next door say that. "Mommy, what does 'mercy' mean?" she asked.

"Mercy means love," Mommy told her. "It means someone feels sorry about something that happened to you and then tries to help you."

"Yes," said Mommy. "He showed mercy. But the person who shows us the most mercy is the Lord Jesus."

"Why does Jesus feel sorry for us?" asked Holly.

"Because without His help we're in trouble," answered Mommy.

"What kind of trouble?" Holly asked.

"Well, we haven't always done what God wants us to do, have we?" Mommy asked.

"No," answered Holly, "not always."

"But God can't let our sins go without punishment," Mommy said. "Jesus saved us from being punished by letting His Father punish Him instead of us."

Holly's mom was right. Jesus felt sorry—He had mercy—for us because we were all in trouble with God. Jesus loved us so much that He died on the cross so everyone could have forgiveness. "With the LORD there is steadfast love." That is why we love Him so much.



Let's talk:

What do you think the word mercy means? Why did the Lord Jesus feel sorry for all people? How did He help us out of the trouble of sin? What does God give us instead of punishment? Why does God forgive us? Memorize the Bible verse.

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 130

Let's pray: Dear Lord, heavenly Father, we know that we sin every day and deserve to be punished. But with You there is mercy and unfailing love, and we thank You for forgiving our sins. Help us act as You want us to, for Jesus' sake. Amen.



We Belong to God

Jeremiah's dog ran away. He ended up in a yard down the street. The boy who lived there locked the dog in his garage.

One day Jeremiah was walking down the alley. He heard a dog barking inside a garage. Jeremiah looked through the garage window and saw his dog.

But Jeremiah knew that the boy who lived there would not give his dog back. So he told the boy, "I'll give you \$5.00 for that dog." The boy wanted the \$5.00 more than he wanted the dog, so he sold the dog to Jeremiah. Jeremiah bought him back. That's what "redeem" means—to buy back.

Do you know that we, too, were bought back? God made us, and we belong to Him. But like everybody else, we ran away from God. We didn't love Him and we did wrong things. We call that sinning. When people sin, the devil tries to keep them with him. Those who belong to the devil can't get away from him by themselves.

But God bought us back. He redeemed us. Like Jeremiah, God paid for us. When Jesus died for us on the cross, that was the price He paid to get us back as His children. Jesus, our Savior, saved us from sin and from the devil. God says in the Bible, "Return to Me, for I have redeemed you."



Let's talk:

What happened to Jeremiah's dog? How did Jeremiah get his dog back? To whom do all people belong? When does the devil get hold of people? What did Jesus do to buy us back for God? Who returned us to God?

Older children and adults may read:

Isaiah 44:21–23

Let's pray: Thank You, God, for redeeming us and taking us back although we often sin and run away from You. Help us remember how much You paid to have us as Your children. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



Getting Along with Others

Have you ever set up dominoes or small blocks of wood one behind the other? When the front block is pushed over, the whole row falls down. Why? Because each block hits the next one as it falls.

There's a way of stopping the whole row from falling—just take one block out of the row. Then the hitting and falling will stop.

An argument is like a row of dominoes. One person's words hit at the next person's words, and they fall over each other. Do you know how to stop an argument? Take out one angry bunch of words that hits at what the other person says. Say something friendly instead, or just don't say anything. See if that stops the argument.

Jesus said to His friends and followers, "Have peace with one another." That means, "Get along with one another." Our Bible verse says, "Live in peace." The opposite of peace is fighting and arguing, which is fighting with words.

Is it possible to live in peace with everybody? How about the boy who tries to start an argument? Or the girl who's always stirring up trouble? It can be difficult to avoid trouble. But the Bible says, "If it is possible, as much as you can, live in peace with everybody." God wants us to try to get along with others.

God is love, and God loves peace. When Jesus lives in our hearts, we can love others and try to live in peace. And the Bible says the God of love and peace has promised to be with us.



Let's talk:

What does it mean to "have peace" or to "live in peace" with one another? How can we usually stop a fight? Who helps us live in peace with others? Why is God called the God of love and peace?

Older children and adults may read:

Romans 12:14-21

Let's pray: Dear Father in heaven, please forgive all the fighting we have done. Be with us in our hearts so we can live in peace with other people. We ask this because we are Your children. In Jesus' name. Amen.



Why Keep On Praying?

There was once a judge who didn't care about people at all. He didn't even care about God. One day a widow came to him. "Please help me," she begged. "My enemy is trying to harm me."

The judge said, "Don't bother me. I don't have time for you." So the widow went away.

The next day, the widow came back to the judge and asked for his help again. Once more he told her to go home. But she came back the next day and the next day and the next day. She kept coming day after day. She did not leave him alone. She didn't give up asking.

At last the judge said, "I don't care about God, and I don't care about this widow. But because she keeps on bothering me, I will help her; otherwise she will wear me out." The judge helped her so she would stop coming to him for help.

After Jesus finished telling this story, He said, "Remember what this uncaring judge said and did. Won't God give help to His own people who keep on praying to Him day and night? I tell you, He will hurry to help them."

So Jesus told us to keep on praying, even when God doesn't seem to help us right away. God loves us and will answer our prayers much more quickly than the judge who helped the widow.



Let's talk:

What did the widow ask the judge? Why didn't the judge want to help her? Why did he finally help her? Why did Jesus tell the story about the widow and the judge? Why will God always help us? Why doesn't He always help us right away?

Older children and adults may read:

Luke 18:1-8

Let's pray: Dear Lord, please help us in all our troubles. Teach us to pray to You for help and to keep on praying. We know that You love us, and we're glad You have promised to answer our prayers. Please hear our prayers for Jesus' sake. Amen.



Imitating Jesus

Boy Scouts are asked to do one good deed every day. Do you think Jesus was satisfied with doing only one good deed a day? The Bible says, "[Jesus] went about doing good." Wherever He went, Jesus did good; and whatever He did was good.

What are some of the good things Jesus did?

Jesus worked. He was a carpenter. He made things other people could use. Jesus wants us to work. You can help your parents by helping around the house. You can do your homework without being told. Jesus will help you do your work well.

Jesus healed the sick. We can't heal the sick, but we can pray for them, cheer them up, and help them in other ways. You might even become a doctor or a nurse.

When people were hungry, Jesus gave them something to eat. Jesus wants us to feed the hungry. He said that when we give food to hungry people because we love Him, we are doing good to Him.

Jesus taught people about God. Jesus talked to people about His Father in heaven and about Himself and how people could become God's children. We can take people to Sunday School and church and give people Bibles and other books that tell the Good News about Jesus, our Savior.

Jesus went around doing good. And Jesus promises to help us do good, too.



Let's talk:

What does our Bible verse say Jesus did wherever He went? What were some good things Jesus did? How can we help the sick? How can we help people learn more about God and the way to heaven? Why do Christians want to do good?

Older children and adults may read:

Acts 10:36-43

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, we want to be like Jesus. Forgive us for not doing as much good as we can. Help us grow up doing good as Jesus did. In His name we ask this. Amen.



Don't Quit Doing Good

A man on television was helping people get jobs. Out of the first thousand people for whom he got jobs, how many do you think said thank you? Only ten. Should he quit trying to help people just because they weren't thankful?

Jesus once passed by a place where there were ten men sick with leprosy. Doctors in Jesus' time weren't able to heal people with this disease. There was no hope for these men. They begged Jesus to help them, and Jesus did. He healed them. But how many came back to say thank You to Jesus? Only one. Did Jesus quit doing good because people weren't thankful?

Jesus never gets tired of being good to people. To whom does He still do good? To you and me and everyone else in the world, even though we often forget to thank Him. We even disobey Him in many ways every day. You'd think He would get tired of doing good for us. But He keeps right on forgiving us and loving us and helping us.

So why should we get tired of helping other people? "Let us not grow weary [or tired] of doing good," the Bible says. If people don't appreciate what we do for them, remember that most people didn't thank Jesus either, and they still don't. Even we don't. But Jesus keeps right on being good to everyone. And He will help us keep doing good if we ask Him.



Let's talk:

How many people said thanks to the man on the television? How many of the men Jesus healed from leprosy came back to thank Him? Who never gets tired of doing good? What does the Bible verse tell us?

Older children and adults may read:

Galatians 6:1-10

Let's pray: Dear Jesus, we're glad that You never get tired of doing good to us. Please help us show our thanks by never getting tired of doing good for other people. Amen.





Something to Get Rid Of

When Brian didn't get what he wanted right away, he'd scream. If his mother didn't come running, he screamed even louder. If Brian screamed hard enough and loud enough and got red in the face, his mother would do anything he wanted.

Brian learned to get his way by becoming angry and screaming. He would lose his temper whenever his friends didn't do what he wanted. He would yell mean things, even about his friends, when they didn't do what he wanted.

Brian grew up and got married. He always had to have his way. When his wife and children didn't obey him, he threw things at them, yelled at them, and hit them. His wife was afraid of him, and his children didn't love him.

What if God, our Father in heaven, were like Brian? What if God became angry and punished us every time we didn't do what He wants? He'd be punishing us all the time, wouldn't He?

But the Bible says, "The Lord is slow to become angry." Because God is good and full of love, He is kind and forgiving. He sent His Son, Jesus, to die for us on the cross so He wouldn't have to punish us. And Jesus rose again and makes us God's dear children.

God wants His children to be like Him. That's why He says, "Get rid of all bitterness . . . and anger."



Let's talk:

What did Brian do to get his way when he was little? Why were his wife and children afraid of him? What if God became angry at us for not doing what He wants? Why is God slow to become angry and willing to forgive us? How does He want us to treat others?

Older children and adults may read:

Psalm 145:1-8

Let's pray: Dear Lord God, it is wonderful to know that You are full of love and slow to become angry. Continue to love us for the sake of Jesus, our Savior. Help us to get rid of all anger and mean talk. In Jesus' name we ask this. Amen.



God's Law Is Good

"Why is it wrong to steal?" Yuri asked his mother. "I wish it were all right to steal. Then I could take candy from the store when I want to."

That night Yuri had a dream. He dreamed that it wasn't wrong to steal. In his dream, he went to a store and took some candy. He also took some apples and some potato chips.

"Well, honey, some of these people make a lot of money begging on the streets," Mom answered. "They don't want to work. But a lot of these people have lost their jobs and homes and even their families. They need our help."

It's true that some people ask for things they don't really need. But there are many people in this world who are poor and have no way to feed themselves or their families, buy clothing, or find a home to live in. These are the people we are to help as if we were helping Jesus Himself.

There are people all around us who need our help. Does your church have a food pantry or a clothing drive? Do you collect toys or winter clothes at Christmas? Can your family volunteer at a shelter during Thanksgiving or Easter?

When we give money, food, clothing, or our time to help others, it's the same as if we were giving to the Lord. God's Word says, "Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the LORD." And what we give to the Lord, He will pay back to us in many ways.



Let's talk:

Do you know of someone who may need your help? What can you do for them? To whom do we lend when we give to the poor? What does God promise to do for those who are kind to the poor?

Older children and adults may read:

Deuteronomy 24:19-21

Let's pray: Thank You for all the good things we have received from You, dear Father in heaven. Please give us loving hearts so we will gladly help those in need. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.



Happy People

"How are you, my boy?" asked Mr. Timmons.

"Great," called Andre as he ran up the steps into his house.

"Mom, why does Mr. Timmons call me his boy? I'm not his boy," Andre said as he put his backpack on the kitchen table.

"Oh, many grown-up people talk that way," said Mom. "It means that he likes you, as if you were his son."

In our Bible verse, the disciple John was writing to people who weren't his children, but he called them his children. He loved them as though they were his children. And in one way they were his children. He had taught them God's Word. He had been their pastor and teacher.

One day John received a letter that said the Christians he had taught in Ephesus were kind to the poor. That made him very happy. Then somebody told John that his church members were good to the people who were working for Jesus. That also made him happy. John knew by their actions that the Christians in Ephesus loved Jesus. That's why he wrote, "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth."

To walk in the truth means to do what God says. It means believing and doing what the Bible teaches. Our ministers and teachers and our parents are glad, too, when they see their "children" walk in the truth. Nothing makes them happier than to see their children living as Christians.

But we walk in the truth only if we keep learning the truth. That's why it's so important for us to study the Bible in our home, to go to Sunday School, to attend a Christian day school and high school if we can, and to go to church together every time we can.

Serving Others As Jesus Did

"Mommy, would you please get me a drink of water," asked Nicole. She was sick in bed. Mommy was glad to do it. She served Nicole by getting her a glass of water.

When Nicole was better, she asked, "Mommy, would you please get me a drink of water." This time she could have gotten it herself, but she didn't want to walk into the kitchen.

"I think you can get your own glass of water now that you're better," said Mommy. "I don't want you to learn to depend on others for things you can do yourself. The Bible tells us to serve one another. That means we should be ready to help others, not always wait to be helped."

"Yes, I would. Thank you, Nicole, for thinking of me," answered Mommy. She was glad that Nicole was willing to serve.

God wants us to be helpful to other people, to love them enough to serve them. Jesus said that to become great in His kingdom, we must serve others. After all, Jesus gave His life for us, and we are to be imitators of Him.

Many people are far away from God and are lost. They think they're going to heaven, but they're going the wrong way. Jesus is looking for them. He came to find the lost people and save them.

Seventy-Seven Times

"I'm never going to speak to him again," Hope yelled as she stomped into the family room. She was angry because her brother, Evan, had called her a fat cat.

"Aren't God's children supposed to forgive one another?" Dad asked.

"I'm tired of forgiving him," Hope replied. "Why do I always have to forgive?"

"Hope, did you know that the disciple Peter once asked Jesus, 'Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?' What do you think Jesus answer-ed?" Dad asked. "Jesus said, 'Not seven times, but seventy-seven times.'"

Why do you think Jesus said seventy-seven times? He meant we should always be willing to forgive, no matter how often somebody does something wrong against us. After all, Jesus forgives us every time we sin.

Jesus told Peter this story: "Once there was a man who owed his king more than he could ever pay back. So the king decided to sell the man and his wife and children as slaves. But when the man begged the king not to do it, the king forgave his debt and said he wouldn't have to pay anything at all.

"As the man left the king's palace, he saw someone who owed him only a small amount. Because he couldn't pay the debt, the man put him in prison. When the king heard about this, he became angry. He had his soldiers bring the unkind man back to him. The king said, 'You wicked servant, I canceled all that you owed me. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' Then the king put the man in jail until he could pay back everything he owed." (See Matthew 18:21–34.)

Then Jesus said, "This is how My heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart" (Matthew 18:35, NIV). Our Father in heaven forgives our sins and He expects us to do the same for other people.



Let's talk:

What did Peter think would be enough times to forgive someone? How often does Jesus say we are to forgive? What did Jesus mean when He said, "Seventy-seven times"? How much did the king forgive the unkind servant? How much has God forgiven us? Why was the servant punished?

Older children and adults may read:

Matthew 18:23–35

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, we're thankful that You have forgiven us thousands of times and that You are always willing to forgive us for Jesus' sake. Please give us Your Holy Spirit so we will always be willing to forgive other people for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Jesus answered, "Whoever has seen Me has seen the Father." Jesus, the Son of God, is exactly like His Father, so those who know Jesus know what God is like.

What was Jesus like when He was on earth? The Bible tells us He was kind. He loved children. He could do anything. He helped people. Jesus taught people about life with God. He even died on the cross so we can live with Him in heaven.

Don't Worry about Tomorrow

One evening Martin Luther looked out a window in his house. In a tree nearby, he saw a little bird getting ready for the night. Look how that little bird teaches us to trust in God, Luther said to himself. That bird takes hold of his twig, tucks his head under his wing, and goes to sleep. He lets God care for him.

Sometimes children worry about tomorrow. They wonder what they'll get to do, or whether they'll have good grades in school, or how they can become somebody's best friend, or what people will think about them.

Jesus once told us to look at the birds. They don't worry about tomorrow. They don't even work, and God still feeds them. "Are you not of more value than they?" Jesus asked (Matthew 6:26).

Jesus wants people to work. The Bible says, "If anyone is not willing to work, let him not eat" (2 Thessalonians 3:10). God wants children to learn how to work. But He tells us not to worry about our work or about anything else. He loves us and will take care of us. We can trust in Him.

"Only believe," said Jesus to a man who was worried that his daughter was dead (Luke 8:50). Jesus made the girl alive. All we have to do is trust in Jesus, and He will see that everything turns out for the best.

Why did Jesus tell us not to worry about food and clothes? How do we know that He wants us to work and that He doesn't want us to worry? What did Jesus tell Jairus when his daughter died?

Matthew 6:24-34

Let's pray: Dear Lord Jesus, help us trust in You so we don't have to worry. Teach us that tomorrow will take care of itself because You are our God and care for us. In Your name. Amen.



God's Blessings

Did you ever watch a chicken hunt for something to eat? It scratches the ground, moving the grass and stones away. When it sees something to eat, it picks it up. Chickens work and scratch for a living. But we aren't chickens. God provides for our needs.

God has promised to bless us every day. Sometimes His blessings come through the talents He gives. For example, we ask God for daily bread and He gives us the ability to earn money for food.

When Jesus talked about God's blessings, He said "seek, and you will find." We see God as the giver of all good things. We see Him every time we read the Bible or hear about God at church. As we learn more about God through His Word, the Holy Spirit increases our trust in God's unconditional love.

We ask God for the things we need, and we look and listen for the ways He gives things to us. When we ask God to teach us more about Himself, His answer is in the Bible. We learn about God in His Word in Sunday School, at church, and at home. That's where we find God's promises. We see His blessings all around us. The greatest blessing God gave, we didn't work for at all. He sent His Son to be our Savior.




Let's talk:

Carlos and Jake were reading about Elijah and how he was taken into heaven in a chariot of fire. The two boys talked about the chariot and how it must have looked. They wondered about the horses that pulled it.

"I'd be afraid to ride in a chariot like that, wouldn't you?" asked Carlos.

"I wouldn't be afraid—at least not if God were driving," Jake answered.

People who believe in Jesus know that God loves them. They say what King David said in Psalm 23, "The LORD is my Shepherd" (23:1). Jesus is like a good shepherd who takes very good care of his lambs and sheep. Jesus doesn't let anything hurt us.

Do you know the rest of Psalm 23? In it, King David also said, "I will fear no evil, for You are with me." People who belong to Jesus have the promise that He will hold them close. When the angels had gone back to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go to Bethlehem right away and see the Savior." So they left their sheep and hurried away. In Bethlehem they found Mary and Joseph and the baby Jesus lying on some hay in a manger. How happy they were! What the angel had told them was true! God's Son, the promised Savior, had come from heaven to save them from their sins and take them to heaven. The shepherds left the manger and told many others what they knew about Jesus.
